

General Principles

1.-Aims and Method.

The Girl Guide Movement has been incorporated by Royal Charter for the purpose of developing good citizenship among girls by forming their character; training them in habits of observation, obedience and self-reliance; inculcating loyalty and thoughtfulness for others; teaching them services useful to the public and handicrafts useful to themselves; promoting their physical development; making them capable of keeping good homes and of bringing up good children. Its desire is to co-operate with educational and other bodies working to this end.

The method of training is to give the girls pursuits which appeal to them, such as games and recreative exercises, which lead them on to learn for themselves many useful crafts. It is a scheme of elder and younger sisters playing games together, rather than the instruction of privates by officers in a cut-and-dried disciplinary machine, or of pupils by school teachers in an academic curriculum.

2.-Membership.

(a) The Association can admit to membership only those who accept as a basis the threefold promise of the Guides or the two-

fold promise of the Brownies, the Guide Law, and the system of instruction contained in "Girl Guiding," by Lord Baden-Powell, and "Policy, Organisation and Rules."

- (b) The Association is open to British subjects.
- (c) All girls enrolled into a registered Brownie Pack or Girl Guide Company are members of the Girl Guide Association, as are all Guiders and members of the Local Association.
- (d) The Association is anxious to promote international peace by entering into friendly relations with organisations outside the British Commonwealth which have similar aims in view, and to exchange visits, correspondence and ideas with them, but is not permitted to extend affiliation to foreign societies.
- (e) Girls who are not British subjects may be enrolled into a registered Brownie Pack or Girl Guide Company as members of the Girl Guides Association, with the permission of the Victorian International Sub-Committee.

WORLD RELIGIOUS POLICY

The religious policy of the Girl Guides is inter-denominational. Every Guide should attend the services of the religious denomination to which she belongs, and where a Company is composed of members of one particular form of religion, denominational religious observances and instruction may be arranged.

Where a Company consists of Guides of different denominations, each should be encouraged to attend the services of her own church; in camp, the form of daily and weekly worship is of the simplest character, and attendance is voluntary.

FEDERAL COUNCIL OF THE GIRL GUIDES ASSOCIATIONS OF AUSTRALIA

The Federal Council of the Girl Guides Associations of Australia directs a general policy for the Movement within the Commonwealth, in matters which affect the State Associations as a whole and which concern Australia in the international sphere of Guiding.

The President is Her Excellency, the wife of the Governor-General of Australia.

The Council consists of the Chief Commissioner for Australia, who acts as Chairman, all State Commissioners, and not more than two delegates from each State appointed by the respective Executive Committees. Council meets at least once in every two years.

There is an Executive Committee consisting of the Chief Commissioner and all State Commissioners.

Federal officers appointed by the Council include: International Commissioner, Training Adviser, Post Box Secretary, Council Fire Correspondent, Honorary Secretary, and Honorary Treasurer. These officers are entitled to attend, but not to vote, at meetings of the Council.

VICTORIAN ADMINISTRATION

The governing body is the State Council, which directs the general policy, and exercises a general supervision and control over the affairs of the Association, working through the Executive Committee. The State Council is composed of ladies and gentlemen of representative character, whose standing ensures the soundness of the Movement in the eyes of parents and public, representatives appointed by the various societies of the State who are interested in social welfare, and six members elected by each of the following: Commissioners, Guiders, and Local Associations.

The membership of the State Executive Committee is as follows: The State President, State Commissioner, Assistant State Commistioners, the Hon. Treasurer, Advisers for Brownies, Rangers, Guides, Camping and Training, and not more than 12 other persons elected by the State Council from its own members.

The administration is decentralised; in each district a Commissioner and Local Association are responsible for all Girl Guide activities, and publish annually a report and balance-sheet for their own area.

Annual Report

1955-1956

The Executive Committee and State Council of the Girl Guides Association of Victoria have the honour to present the Report and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th June, 1956.

The year has been one of steady progress and expansion; not only has Guiding within the borders of our State flourished with growing public approval and support, but we have had the added stimulus of three outstanding visitors from overseas: Mrs. Alan Means (Chairman of the World Committee of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts) and the Misses Getsie Samuel (India) and Berit Bredesen (Norway), both of whom

came to us as Exchange Trainers under the scheme sponsored by the World Association. These visitors, such able representatives of their own countries, made a reality of the fourth Guide Law, that a Guide is a friend to all and a sister to every other Guide. Further evidence of the international outlook is the fact that Guides in this State are, through our Post Box, corresponding with members of the Movement in the United States of America, Canada, Rhodesia, Ceylon, Hawaii, Fiji, Germany, New Caledonia, Scandinavia, and other European countries.

At the end of May we had the honour of a visit from the Chief Commissioner for Australia, Miss Manning. As well as going into residence with the Commissioners at Cheltenham, and opening the Commissioners' Conference, Miss Manning also met many Guiders and members of the State Council.

Mcmbcrs of the Movement took part, as usual, in the St. George's Day Service and the Empire Youth March; 400 Guides from all parts of the State (including Lones and Extensions) attended the Youth Garden Party at Government House in March as guests of His Excellency the Governor and Lady Brooks, and ten Queen's Guides received their Certificates from His Excellency the Governor at the special Scout and Guide ceremony held on the lawns of Government House last October.


Tangible evidence of our expansion is shown by the fact that six new Division Commissioners and thirty-six District Commissioners have been appointed; these replaced two retiring Division and twenty-six retiring District Commissioners. As the Commissioners play a very large part in the efficient decentralisation of the Movement, it will be seen by the difference in these numbers that Guiding is being effectively spread to all corners of the State.

Another most important factor in decentralisation, and a significant step forward in the Training programme, has been the acquisition of the Camp Travelling Training Unit; because it was felt that, for various practical reasons, Camping was not keeping pace with other branches of Training, it was suggested to the Local Association Conference in 1955 that such a Unit should be purchased: so great was the enthusiasm of the various Local Associations that, with their

help augmented by support from the Victorian Government, General Motors-Holdens Ltd. and S. A. Cheney Pty. Ltd., the Van was actually on the road, fully equipped, within six months. By the time the Van was officially Rangers and Cadets) to Government House and, with the co-operation of the Press, provided excellent publicity at the outset. One result of the Drive was that Victoria was able to allocate £50 to the Irene Fairbairn Trust

"opened" by our State President, Lady Brooks, at the 1956 Local Association Conference, it had already visited many parts of the State, including Wodonga, Mornington, Traralgon, Dimboola, and Tawonga; thus Guiders who wish to take their own Guides camping (and this is one of the cornerstones of Guiding) have the opportunity of doing their practical training near their own homes.

Expansion implies available finance; once again we have been most fortunate in our grants from the Victorian Government and the National Fitness Council of Victoria, as well as donations that have been given to the War Memorial Fund and other funds within the Movement. However, as we were faced with a large deficit it was decided, this year, to hold a Willing Shilling Drive for a week in April; each Division forwarded half the amount raised locally to Headquarters, with the gratifying result that, after the deduction of administrative expenses, the sum of £1,965 became available for Headquarters expenditure. The Willing Shilling Drive was materially aided by His Excellency the Governor and Lady Brooks, who invited 12 members of the Movement (Brownies, Guides, Fund, established in 1955 as a mark of appreciation for the work done by Mrs. C. O. Fairbairn, O.B.E., as the first Chief Commissioner for Australia.

Properties controlled by Headquarters (as distinct from those owned by various Divisions or Districts) continue to prosper; through the generosity of Mr. George Whitlam, several additional acres at Mt. Morton, Belgrave, have been given to us for camping, and we have also purchased an adjoining block: this lovely land—a tree and wildflower sanctuary—is convenient to Melbourne, an important factor to both city and country campers. House, at Yarra Junction, now has S.E.C. electricity; renovations and improvements have been carried out to the various properties. and a new building, to accommodate five, has been erected on Hamer's site; Gipton also has some new equipment.

So popular have the Patrol Leaders' Conferences become that this year no fewer than four were held, at Ballarat, Shepparton, Yallourn, and Melbourne; the total attendance was 450 Patrol Leaders, 50 country districts being represented.

Again the Patrol Challenge was entered upon with enthusiasm; it was successfully completed by 70 Patrols, and culminated in a Field Day and Camp Fire attended by 260 Guides and held, through the courtesy of the Boy Scouts, at Herring Island in September.

At Easter 175 Patrol Leaders camped at Guide House, concentrating on training for the Pioneer Badge; nearly all passed some clauses of the badge, and many completed it; several also passed the Patrol Leader's Camp Permit, enabling them to take their own Patrols camping.

* * * * *

This year has seen much active and profitable work in the Training Department. In the metropolitan area both Brownie and Guide classes have been held throughout the year, running to capacity with more and more Guiders coming in. In the country, Maryborough, Castlemaine, Stawell, Camperdown and Echuca were the centres of very successful trainings, and additionally many towns have been visited to give initial or extra training to Guiders. The fact that eight Training Certificates (five Guide and three Brownie) were gained is evidence of the keen interest of both Guiders and the Training Adviser and staff. In the Camping Department, too, many qualifications have been gained, including 10 Camper's Licences, 12 Guider's Camp Permits, and 6 Indoor Camp Certificates.

At the end of July, 1955, the Ranger Branch lost their Adviser when Miss Helen Carnegie resigned; for many months the Branch was without an Adviser, so that central activities were curtailed, but in May we were very pleased to welcome Mrs. K. G. Woollacott, M.B.E., as our new Ranger Adviser.

Last September the Rangers, together with Cadets, took part as usual in the march of Youth Organisations at the Showgrounds Rally, and were responsible for planning and carrying out a special Colour Ceremony on the arena. They also played an effective part in the Festival of Empire Pageant at the Town Hall in May.

Ranger Week last July was successful in bringing the work of this Branch before the public, and culminated in a Parade at Wesley Church; other activities, particularly camping, went forward as usual during the year, not least being the period under canvas when



Rangers and Cadets gave their assistance in the Hospital at the Scout Jamboree at Wonga Park.

The Lone Section helps to spread Guiding throughout the State, and in many cases Lone Guides have been absorbed in active Companies when these have been formed in their districts. Lones take part in every aspect of Guiding—as an example, they raised £14 for the Willing Shilling Drive. The Shepparton Lone Ranger Patrol has helped with the aboriginal settlement, while Companies have helped such diverse causes as the Bendigo Toddlers' Home, the Children's Hospital, the Labassa Guides and Brownies (Fiji) and the Papuan Guides. Lones and their Guiders have as their theme for this year, "More outdoor adventure and less fireside Guiding."

Extensions also played their part in general Guiding activities; Guides and Rangers both had the experience of camping, and as far as possible the Extension Companies are integrated in District events; thus they meet our visitors from overseas and mingle with

their sister Guides, widening their horizons and adding to the interests they can enjoy.

Our monthly magazine, "Matilda," has prospered during the year under the splendid editorial committee headed by Miss G. H. Swinburne as Editor, assisted by Miss Dorothy Cooper and Mrs. O. G. M. Knight; an all-time record of 1,000 copies has been printed, and many new features introduced.

Despite the frustration of cramped quarters, the Equipment Department has had a most successful year. Business has increased and many new lines have been added.

Much quiet but good work has gone on in the 11 Trefoil Guilds, which are scattered throughout Victoria; First Aiding at Camp, making equipment for Companies and raising money for camp equipment are but some of the ways in which those who enjoyed Guiding in their schooldays are helping the present generation.
