

CHIEF COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

The Report of the Girl Guides Association of Australia for 1965-66 reveals many facets of our Movement: not only are our Brownies, Guides and Senior Branch members continually expanding their interests, but there is continual and increasing need for adult members to give their time and talents to administration; it is good to be able to report, therefore, that support from adults has been forthcoming, for without these hard-working people there could be no expansion of numbers among the children, nor could we play our full part in the life of the community.

A particular pleasure was the opportunity of welcoming our Royal Patron, Her Majesty The Queen Mother, to South Australia and Western Australia, during Her Majesty's visit to attend the Adelaide Festival of Arts.

An event of importance to our Movement, and a particularly happy occasion, was the presentation to Her Excellency The Lady Casey of her Badge of Office as President of the Girl Guides Association of Australia; this took place, by courtesy of His Excellency The Governor-General, at Admiralty House, Sydney, on 15th March. The brief ceremony was held on the balcony, in the presence of representatives of all States, together with our office-bearers resident in Sydney: a Brownie, a Guide and a Senior Branch member played their parts in the ceremony with charm and dignity.

As Chief Commisioner, the year for me has been varied, busy, stimulating and rewarding; an unexpected invitation from the World Committee to act as a Vice-Chairman of the forthcoming 19th World Conference of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in Tokyo necessitated a trip to London in February, to attend a World Committee meeting, and by great good fortune I was thus able to be present in Westminster Abbey for the Thanksgiving

Service to commemorate the birthday of our Founder, Lord Baden-Powell. On my way home to Australia I had the pleasure of a visit to India, where I not only saw our nearly completed International Training Centre, "Sangam" at Poona, but was able to attend the Thinking Day Service held there on 22nd February. During a further week in India, I enjoyed the privilege of being a guest at several gatherings, including the Eighth All-India Commissioners' and Secretaries' Conference in New Delhi.

Our links with Sangam were further strengthened by the visit in April of our Vice-President, Mrs. C. O. Fairbairn, O.B.E., who was Director of the Sangam Appeal in Australia.

Training as a word applied to Guiding may, to those outside the Movement, imply a rigidity of method and outlook; on the contrary, training (apart from the necessary technical aspects) emphasises the interpretation of the principles of Guiding; for where there is a lack of understanding in this field there is a danger of the very rigidity which we must avoid if Guiding is to retain its challenge and its joy.

These aspects of Guiding were discussed in depth during the Diploma'd Guiders' Conference, held at the Guide House, Britannia Creek, Victoria, during January. Particular attention was paid to the problem of Age Groupings, and the Revision of Tests in the light of changing conditions, coupled with the necessity for uniform standards for the training of Commissioners.

This year, for the first time, a Conference of the Editors of our various State Guide magazines was held in Melbourne in April. A panel of speakers on subjects related to the printed word, and visits to newspaper and printing establishments, was ar-The Editors, who, by the ranged. very nature of their work, had previously felt isolated, gained in confidence and in knowledge. and already this is reflected in the State

Guide magazines.

The Australian Extension Guiders' Training Conference, held in Queensland at the end of April, was attended by Guiders from Canada, India and New Zealand, and all parts of Aus-The Conference proved an tralia. admirable forum for the exchange of ideas on the education and welfare of handicapped girls, and the part which Guiding can play in helping them to assume a significant role in the life of the community. We are conscious of the fact that membership of our Movement can help to provide the climate which encourages, stimulates and accepts a handicapped girl, and which can help her to adjust to her handicap (this attitude stays with the girl even after she ceases to be a member of an active Guide unit; for instance, one Trefoil Guild unit of physically handicapped members purchased wool with money raised by their own individual efforts. and knitted 135 articles for orphans in Korea).

Among the camps and gatherings of various kinds, Camp Kindamindi a most interesting and rewarding Camp for Patrol Leaders — was held last August near Sydney. Concurrently, a Friendship Camp for Guiders was held separately, but adjacent to the main Camp.

Without leaving their own State, a party of 26 Senior Branch members in Western Australia proved the wisdom of the Founder's advice to "Look Wide!" Taking advantage of air travel they travelled through the north-west of the Continent, making contact with members of the Movement and seeing with their own eyes the dramatic development of this remote area.

We continue to give our support to Guiding in Papua-New Guinea, not only in the area of finance, but also in more personal ways. Last January

some twelve Guiders and Trainers paid their own way from N.S.W. to assist in the running of the Territory Guiders' Training Camp at Sogeri — this was attended by Guiders and some Commissioners (94 in all) from most districts of Papua and New Guinea.

In May, fifteen members of the Senior Branch (drawn from all States) spent a fortnight in the Territory on a new project; again paying their own fares, and providing their own food, the girls worked for a week at the newly opened Ryder-Cheshire Home for Handicapped Children at Hohola. Here, in happy company with 10 girls from the Territory, they tackled the arduous and unglamorous tasks of digging drains, planting trees, vegetables and lawns, and painting the staff quarters, as well as taking part in the more usual feminine pursuits of sewing, laundry and even to their great delight — helping briefly to minister to the pathetically handicapped children for whom the Home was established. Subsequently the entire party spent an adventurous few days exploring the Territory, travelling by trawler and canoe, or on foot, everywhere meeting and making friends with the women and children of the country. All felt it had been a most worthwhile experience, and Guiding as a whole can be proud, not only of those who took part, but also those who had the original vision of this project and worked for its fulfilment.

Once again, by courtesy of the Girl Guides Association of New South Wales, an Australian Executive meeting was held last August at Glengarry, the N.S.W. Training Centre near Sydney. This meeting has increased in significance since the decision was made to hold our Council meetings only every three years, and not the least part of their value is the opportunity, in a residential Conference, of

discussion of mutual problems in an informal atmosphere.

Through the Juliette Low Fund of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., Australia has been invited to send two delegates to an international gathering — in this case to the East-West Mutual Relations Conference, to be held in Hawaii in August, 1966. Candidates from all States came to Sydney to meet a Selection Committee, the final choice being Julianne Stubbs (Queensland) and Susan Kenny (Tasmania). Additionally, Miss Kay Patterson (N.S.W.), who attended a Juliette Low gathering at "Our Cabana" (Mexico) in 1963, was invited by the organisers to attend as one of the Junior Aides, with Janet Cole (Victoria) as second choice in the event that Kay was not available. We are all delighted at the honour that has thus been paid our former representatives.

All countries visited wrote appreciative letters of the way in which our girls had represented Australia. Although such an assignment sounds a very glamorous one, it is in no way easy, as they have been called upon to appear without notice on television (in some cases immediately on arrival after a long air flight), to address both

contemporary and adult audiences of different types, to make official visits, and even in one case to preach at a church service, without previous warning, on "The Moves Towards Church Unity in Australia"!

For the second time, Miss Peg Barr (at the invitation of the World Association) visited Thailand for a tour of duty as Travelling Trainer at the end of 1965.

Our international links are not forged solely by visits, and through our Post Box some 552 links were made with countries from Israel to Brazil, from Finland to the Philippines. This year brought a striking example of the value of the Post Box, when Miss Elsie Steeves, a Canadian Guider, arrived here to meet for the first time her Guide pen friend of fifteen years, Mrs. Ian Honess.

Through the post, too, though not necessarily through Guide channels, practical friendship in the form of assistance goes from Guides in Tasmania to their "adopted" families in

Korea; and many units of Guiding from Brownie Packs to Trefoil Guilds quietly send funds and comforts overseas to aid distressed children, particularly in Hong Kong.

At home, Miss Marilyn Gilbertson (South Australia) represented us at the UNESCO Seminar on "Youth in the Present-Day World", held at Adelaide in August, 1965.

Mrs. H. Steche, our International Commissioner, was our representative at the Australian Citizenship Convention in January.

Mrs. Gilbert Farrow (State International Representative, Victoria) and Miss Barbara Neill (N.S.W.) attended on our behalf the Youth and Student Seminar on International Affairs, arranged by the National Youth Council of Australia in Canberra in May.

Continued attention has been given to the Australian edition of our "Policy Organisation and Rules"; detailed analysis of every paragraph in the light of Australian conditions has been aided by the willingness of the States to compromise and abide by the majority decision and, as a result, the forthcoming second edition will be more truly "Australian" than the first.

With the Boy Scouts Association of Australia we look forward to a special event next year — the visit, sponsored by both Associations, of the World Chief Guide and widow of the Founder, Lady Baden-Powell, G.B.E.

Co-operation with Scouting, increasing at all levels, was particularly successful during the annual "Jamboree on the Air". Many members of the Guide Movement took part in this operation; the Chief Scout Commissioner for Australia, Mr. C. R. Nichols, O.B.E., shares patronage of the Association with me; this applies also to the Guide and Scout Stamp Society of Australia.

Guiding, as we so often stress, is for children; but children grow up, and Guiders grow older, and it is for these members of the Movement, who, for various reasons, can no longer be active participants, that the Trefoil Guild has a part to play — an increasing part in Australia, for membership is growing and the interests of the various groups continue to expand. Apart from the help given to Guiding in many spheres, and what might be termed normal community activity, Guilds have also supported many overseas projects. It is interesting to note that many Trefoil Guild members lately have found it possible

to return to active Guiding and to bring with them, of course, a wealth of experience.

Australia's representative at the Sixth General Assembly of the Fellowship of Former Scouts and Guides in Brussels last August was Miss Erol Plummer, a nurse from Ballarat, Victoria, who is continuing her studies in London.

We record with regret the resignation of Miss Edith Purnell as Australian Trefoil Guild Recorder; her term of office saw a notable increase in both membership and enthusiam and, in addition, Miss Purnell played a significant part in helping to obtain Australian membership in the International Fellowship of Former Scouts and Guides. We welcome her successor, Mrs. E. G. Cameron, of Ballarat, Victoria.

While bricks and mortar do not make Guiding, good Guiding steadily demands buildings to house records, provide a base for efficient administration, for training, and to act as a "home" to units in a given area. One such building, opened this year in Hobart, is of particular significance

to all Australian members of the Movement, for it commemorates the late Gwen Hesketh, M.B.E., Leader of a Guide International Service Team in Europe, a State Commissioner for Tasmania, and a Trainer (under the auspices of the World Bureau) in Korea. Miss Hesketh was one of those Guiders who helped to lay the firm foundations of Guiding in Australia, and the Training Centre, named in her honour, is a fitting tribute to her memory.

The willingness of States to cooperate wherever possible is a most encouraging feature of our national Guiding. With our great distances and limited resources it is imperative that we stretch the latter to their utmost, and it is always a joy to see the ready response with which one State answers a call for help from another.

Each year I become more aware that Guiding is indeed a team game, and that any success achieved is by the combined effort of all members. Our warm and sincere thanks go to them all, for there are far too many to be mentioned individually.

I should like to pay a special tribute to the Australian Government, to our Auditors, our President and Vice-President, all our Australian Advisers and members of Sub-Committees, and to our splendid staff and voluntary helpers at Headquarters who all, without exception, are ever ready to go the second mile, with a cheerfulness and willingness that are a delight to experience.

The Australian Council was formed in 1926, and directs a general policy for the Movement within the Commonwealth in matters which affect the State Associations as a whole, and which concerns Australia in the international sphere of Guiding -Guiding within the States dates back, in some cases, to the period before the First World War, and each State has autonomy in the management of its own affairs.

Her Excellency Lady Stonehaven, wife of the then Governor-General, was the first Australian President in 1926, and this tradition had been preserved unbroken. It was not until 1948 that a Chief Commissioner was appointed, the position being filled by Mrs. C. O. Fairbairn, who remained in office until 1955, when Miss Eleanor Manning was elected. Her term, with an extension, lasted until December, 1962, when Mrs. M. A. Buntine assumed office.

The Council consists of the Chief Commissioner for Australia, who acts as Chairman, all State Commissioners and those Commissioners for Territories who are given the status of State Commissioners by the Council, and not more than two delegates from each State appointed by the respective Executive Committees.

The Executive Committee comprises the Chief Commissioner, all State Commissioners, and those Commissioners for Territories who are given the status of State Commissioners by the Council.

Papua/New Guinea has State status under the Constitution of the Girl Guides Association of Australia; Norfolk Island and Nauru, in the Pacific, are administered by New South Wales and Victoria respectively; Western Australia is responsible for the Guide administration of Christmas Island, in the Indian Ocean; and Guiding in the Northern Territory is the responsibility of the South Australian Association; all, of course, are the ultimate responsibility of the Australian Association.

Australian Treasurer's Report to the Australian Council:

We have now completed the Association's accounts for the financial year 1965-1966.

Expenditure has approximated that anticipated in our budget.

The surplus for the year is attributable in part to the increase in membership fees and surplus on the All-Australian Patrol Leaders' Conference Camp.

The grant account had a balance of \$10,246 at 30th June, 1966, consisting of \$5,346 cash in bank and \$4,900 held in investments. These funds are being held to meet the following expenses budgeted for but unpaid at 30th June, 1966:
