CHIEF COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

In commenting on the past year, I would like to first refer to the interest shown by our President, The Lady Casey. In her frequent visits throughout Australia and the Territories she has given encouragement and support to the Movement on all possible occasions, and this has been greatly appreciated by all she has met.

We shared the very real sorrow of Australia in the tragic loss last December of the then Prime Minister, Mr. Harold Holt. Mr. Holt was a very good friend to Guiding, both as Treasurer and as Prime Minister, and we remember with warm gratitude his unfailing courtesy and kindness.

It was a privilege to represent our World Association at the Y.W.C.A. International Conference in Melbourne and learn something of our mutual aims and problems. I am indebted to Mrs. J. R. Price for taking my place for the final two days of the Conference.

Australian Honorary Treasurer:

Mrs. D. Norton's term of office as Treasurer expired during this year and her increased academic commitments made it impossible for her to accept an extension. She took with her our gratitude for her contribution to this vital and essential aspect of Guiding and our best wishes.

An unexpected bonus connected with our new Headquarters (to which we moved early in the year, with a collective sigh of thankfulness) was to find ourselves in the same building as our new Treasurer, Miss Aline Fenwick. We extend to her a very warm welcome, and she and Miss

Mary Hutchison (Assistant Honorary Treasurer) already appear to be working as a well-co-ordinated team. We are tremendously indebted to Miss Hutchison for her wise and sustained interest, and our debt to her grows larger rather than smaller.

International:

Australia may have been "off the map" once, but it certainly is fast finding its place on it now, and there is every indication that the happy exchange of visits will continue the noticeable upward trend; our International Commissioner (Mrs. Steche) and her Assistant (Mrs. R. T. Forster) have been all but overwhelmed with the ensuing detailed work, compounded in Mrs. Steche's case by her attendance at the International Commissioners' Meeting in Canada, with Mrs. F. Beresford (W.A.).

Two hundred and forty letters of introduction were provided for our overseas travellers during the year — and for those not yet able to travel, nearly 800 links were made with Guides overseas through the Post Box Secretary (Miss Lilian Laidlaw). These covered 21 different countries.

World Centres:

Our members continue to enjoy the opportunities of visiting the different World Centres, and it seems to be a set pattern for young people visiting Europe to call in at Bombay and go up to Sangam, our World Centre at Poona. We are delighted that the present Assistant Guider-in-Charge at Sangam is a Victorian, Miss Sally Alston.

Visitors to Australian Headquarters have also included friends from Bermuda, Great Britain, Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand.

Two special visitors were Miss Kala Phadnis (Guide Trainer from India, who came for one month on a UNESCO Travel Grant) and Miss Shizuko Hosoya (Japan's youngest Trainer). Their visits were for the purpose of gaining experience in Australian Training methods and, through the co-operation of the N.S.W., Queensland and Victorian Guide Associations, it was possible to arrange a comprehensive tour for them.

Training:

Mrs. H. J. Gardner, our Training Adviser, has had a particularly busy and demanding year. Not only was she still discovering all that was expected of her in this capacity, but she has had a tremendous amount of travelling to do and, as we are all aware, she has inevitably been closely concerned with actual and possible changes in our programmes and methods.

Gatherings of Trainers, attended by interstate representatives, have proved of continuing value as a means of pooling ideas and experience, and as a basis for the adoption of new methods on an Australian level. The results of these increased opportunities for Training personnel from the different States to confer and to train together are more than justifying the expenses involved.

Interchange of ideas with Trainers from other countries has, as always, proved valuable; two of our Trainers, Miss M. Wood and Miss A. Miller, attended the Asian Trainers' Conference in Ceylon, and Mrs. A. E. Sharp went to South Africa for three months as a guest Trainer; and we have, of course, had our guest Trainers from India and Japan with us for Trainings in three States.

Australian Working Party:

This body was set up to study the needs of the young members of our Movement, and possible changes in age grouping and programme, with Miss Clare Broadhurst as Co-Ordinator; it has been a particularly complex task: the fact that our numbers are up by nearly 4,000 does not absolve us from the necessity of critical examination of our aims and methods, and it is hoped that the deliberations of our Working Party will prove as stimulating and successful as the forerunner in Great Britain.

Australian Association Development Committee:

This ad hoc committee, set up under the chairmanship of Miss Eleanor Manning to study the structure of our organisation as a whole, has met as required, and recommendations are now under discussion. We appreciate the fact that methods of administration, as well as those of programme, must be brought into line with the standards of the day.

Extensions:

Anyone who has seen Extension

Guiding at work must surely feel that this is one of the finest contributions Guiding has made. The report from the Extension Adviser shows that we are keeping pace with modern trends in dealing with the handicapped, and it is splendid to see what is being achieved.

This is a tribute to the devoted work of the Australian Adviser, Miss Mary Lambe, and her sister Extension Advisers, for they put into practical application the dictum that sympathy, not pity, is the aim of the Extension section. Some of the handicapped members of the Movement have made remarkable progress, one even gaining her Queen's Guide Badge, complying with all the requirements as laid down for the ablebodied.

Public Relations:

Public Relations are assuming an ever-increasing importance and we have been fortunate to have for the past nine years a Public Relations Adviser with the experience and personality of Mrs. D. Curtis-Otter. Her flair for bright thinking produced inspirations such as the "Ice Cream for the Chief" which brought so much joy to the Chief Guide and subsequently made Australian Guiding known in many and varied places through gifts made by her from this fund. We thank her for all she has done during her extended term of office. It is a pleasure to welcome Miss May Douglas as our Adviser for Public Relations, in succession to Mrs. Curtis-Otter; Miss Douglas has long been associated with Guiding in Australia — notably as State Commissioner for South Australia - and she brings a wealth of knowledge and experience of the Guiding scene both at home and abroad.

A visitor with a particular interest in Public Relations was Miss Patricia Ward, Public Relations Adviser for the Association in Wales; she came to us as a holder of a King George VI Mem-

orial Bursary and, through the warm co-operation of the State Associations, she was able to study Guiding and, incidentally, the Australian way of life in all States, including Papua-New Guinea; we are grateful to all who helped map out her comprehensive programme, and also to the Girl Guides Association of Great Britain for sending us so charming and able a representative.

Through our Correspondent, Miss Doris Best, regular and interesting contributions have appeared in our World magazine, "Council Fire" — every issue contains some reference to Australian Guiding, a tribute both to Miss Best and the State Correspondents.

Equipment and Uniform:

These interlocking aspects of our work have been carried out by Mrs. J. Pearce and Mrs. R. Hancock. There are many practical difficulties to be solved in these related fields, not least that of keeping prices down; allied with the variations of our climate, and the differing needs of members whose ages range from — shall we say — eight to 80, it will be appreciated that these office-bearers need a special endowment of patience and a sense of humour.

Awards:

Our Awards Committee has worked faithfully and fairly. This, to me, is an unenviable assignment, as it is surely almost impossible to assess the value of one person's contribution to Guiding compared with another's. We thank them sincerely for their interest and considered decisions.

Superannuation:

The Chairman (Miss Mabel Cooper) of the Superannuation Fund is another to whom we are greatly indebted, together with the members of this Sub-Committee and the Investment Advisory Committee: due to their wise counsel this fund is in a healthy state. Trefoil Guilds:

It is pleasing to note the increase

of nine Trefoil Guilds, and that several members have returned to active Guiding. We regard Trefoil Guilds as a vital and integral part of our structure, and appreciate that they have as much impact on Public Relations as that of the active members; indeed more, in the opinion of that astute observer, H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh. The last Annual Report of the N.S.W. Boy Scouts Association quotes him as saying: "I think it worth remembering that the success of the Scout Movement can only be measured by the way of life of its past members" - and that surely applies equally to our own organisation.

Trefoil Guild members do indeed "Look Wide"; their activities include many social service projects with Homes and Hospitals, among the aged, the physically and the mentally handicapped; they made a generous contribution, too, to a fund established in the Territory of Papua-New Guinea by the Religious Advisory Panel of the Scout and Guide Movements: as a result a special Prayer Book, for use by Scouts and Guides,

has been published there.

The Recorder (Mrs. E. G. Cameron), together with Mrs. A. Morrison (Victoria), was a delegate to the 7th General Assembly of International Scouts and Guides at Durham, England. Incidentally, it is a sign of the times (we are, as an Association, approaching our Diamond Jubilee) that there is now at least one "Two Generation" Guild with mother and daughter combination.

Nauru Independence:

For many years the Girl Guides Association of Victoria has "looked after" Guiding in Nauru on behalf of our Australian Association, and the designated Liaison Commissioner has been Mrs. J. C. Proudfoot. Her interest in the island went far beyond Guiding, and she and her husband became so well known to Nauruan people that they were invited to fly to

the island as honoured guests for the Independence ceremonies on 31st

January, 1968.

During the celebrations, Mrs. Proudfoot presented, on behalf of the Girl Guides Association of Australia, a plaque and a tape-recording of Lord Baden-Powell's talk to Scouts and Guides at the 1937 Jamboree, and one made by Lady Baden-Powell in 1967; these were received by Mrs. Aingimea, Guide Commissioner for Nauru.

Remoteness, indeed, is the lot of so many units of our Movement. Norfolk Island, Christmas Island and many off-shore islands, as well as distant parts of our own vast continent: Aborigine Brownies, for instance, at Elcho Island, 300 miles from Darwin and virtually cut off from the outside world save for the weekly mail plane; or Lone Guides at Maatsuyker and Tasman Islands, south of Tasmania, carrying out their Guiding on bleak outcrops swept by winds from the South Polar region. To young people such as these Guiding is more than a game - it is a deeply significant link with their contemporaries in Australia and, indeed, the world: to the Guiders who devote so much time to these, and indeed all other Companies and Packs, we owe an especial debt of gratitude; in an increasingly materialistic age it is surely significant that more than 10,000 women give their time to Australian Guiding as Guiders and Commissioners-and this figure takes no account of the thousands serving as members of Local Associations and in so many other capacities.

Plans for the future will depend on two things being available — Money and Personnel — and of the two it seems to me that it is the latter — Personnel — which may provide the greater difficulty. The best-conceived plans just will not be successful unless we have the right people to im-

plement them.

Appreciation:

Our Association owes a great debt of gratitude to the many others outside the Movement who help us; the Australian Government, our Auditors (whose honorary annual oversight of our finances deprives them of the services of one of their staff members for an appreciable period); the publicity media; and the many well-wishers whose support is both tangible and inspirational.

I acknowledge that I personally am in debt to more people than I can possibly enumerate. I am sure nobody ever had a friendlier, more loyal and co-operative team with which to work, and I wish I could adequately express my sincere appreciation to our Vice-President (Mrs. Fairbairn), to members of our Executive, our office-bearers and their assistants, and to all our splendid people at Headquarters, both permanent and voluntary.

This is the last report I shall make to you, a fact on which I am not going to dwell except to say how glad I am to be handing over to Mrs. Price, who brings to this office so many fine qualities; I am confident that she will have the same encouragement and friendly help that I have been privileged to receive from members and friends of Guiding throughout Australia.

THE GIRL GUIDES ASSOCIATION OF AUSTRALIA

Guiding in Australia had its beginnings before World War I and became firmly established in the various States within a few years. In 1926 the State Associations, while retaining their own autonomy, together formed The Girl Guides Association of Australia; this Association directs a general policy for the Movement within the Commonwealth in matters which affect the State Associations as a whole, and which concern Australia in the international sphere of Guiding. For Guiding purposes, Papua-New Guinea is regarded as a State.

Her Excellency Lady Stonehaven, wife of the then Governor-General, was the first Australian President in 1926, and the Australian Association has been honoured by the fact that this tradition has been preserved unbroken — the present holder of this office is H.E. The Lady Casey.

Mrs. C. O. Fairbairn, O.B.E., was the first Chief Commissioner, followed by Miss Eleanor Manning, O.B.E., Mrs. M. A. Buntine, O.B.E., and Mrs. J. R. Price, O.B.E. (Chief Commissioner-Designate).

The Council consists of the Chief Commissioner for Australia, all State Commissioners and those Commissioners for Territories given the status of State Commissioners

sioners by the Council, and not more than two delegates from each State.

The Australian Executive Committee comprises the Chief Commissioner, all State Commissioners, and those Commissioners for Territories given the status of State Commissioner by the Council.

Under the Australian Association, Guiding in the Pacific Islands of Nauru and Norfolk Island is administered by Victoria and New South Wales respectively. Western Australia is responsible for the Guide administration of Christmas Island, in the Indian Ocean; and Guiding in the Northern Territory is the responsibility of the South Australian Association.
