

SCOUTING: EDUCATION FOR LIFE

Scouting had its beginning in August 1907 when Baden Powell held an experimental camp at Brownsea Island in England, which was attended by a small group of boys from a wide variety of backgrounds. Baden Powell wanted to test on these boys his ideas of training for a self-reliant and constructive life-style which included the patrol system, individual achievement, learning by doing and other ideas which were unusual at the time, but which still form the basis of

our scout method. Since then, from this small experimental camp for 20 boys, Scouting has grown to become a great Movement for young people with some 17 million members in over 150 countries and territories of the world. The Movement continues to appeal to young people, because it has recognised the need to change its programs and methods to meet their changed needs and aspirations, without changing its basic principles.

SCOUTING IN THE UNITED STATES

A Chicago publisher, William D. Boyce got the Boy Scout idea to the United States. It was a good idea and it would have emigrated sooner or later anyway, but he gave it an energetic impetus.

One foggy night in London he was standing on the sidewalk uncertain of his way. A small boy spoke to him and

asked him where he wanted to go. Then the lad guided him to his destination. Mr. Boyce offered the boy a shilling which he refused saying, "A Scout never takes money for courtesy."

Mr. Boyce was interested and questioned the boy in detail. Then later they both went to the Scout headquarters where he met Sir Robert Baden Powell and learned about the organisation. He was so pleasantly impressed that when he returned to the United States he had the organisation chartered under the laws of the District of Columbia on February 8, 1910, as the Boy Scouts of America.

In Gilwell Park in England stands a bronze statue of a buffalo, the gift of the Boy Scouts of America. It is inscribed "To the unknown Scout whose faithful performance of the "Daily Good Turn" brought the Scout Movement to America."

HOW GANG SHOW STARTED

One of the theatre's greatest success stories owes its existence to a fundraising appeal for a Scout swimming pool. The result is the world-wide Gang Show tradition, with the proud claim that every night, somewhere in the world, a Gang Show is playing.

The swimming pool was for a campsite at Downe, in Kent, England.

London county commissioner Admiral Phillpotts had a chance meeting with rover scout Ralph Reader, who was about to get into a lift at London's scout headquarters. He asked Ralph to write and produce a Scout concert to raise the required funds. Ralph — impatient to get to a luncheon appointment — agreed, and the Gang Show tradition had begun.

EARLY GANG SHOW

The Age on June 10, 1954, reported: "An amateur show with all 8000 tickets sold before opening night . . . This is the proud boast of Melbourne scouts' Gang Show which will open for an eight-night run tomorrow at Cathedral Hall, with a "House Full" sign assured every evening. The cast of about 100 scouts get not a penny for fares. They don't even have free tea for their efforts."

The Sun-News pictorial's review of the 1954 opening night read: "The House Full sign was up last night, and will so remain for the rest of the 8-day run. The scouts plan to book a city theatre next year. They certainly should have no difficulty in filling one . . ."

Gang Show continued to grow and attract larger audiences and the 1955 show was again sold out before opening night.



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STAGE SCENERY — FLATS

Stage scenery has traditionally been constructed from flats of varying shape and size. Their main function is to mask off the immediate back and sides of the stage, creating with the aid of paint and texture a new environment of mood and time. Although in some cases superseded by new materials and techniques, flats are — with curtains — still the most practical and versatile way of building height and width on the stage.

Flats consist of wooden frame over which canvas is tightly stretched and

tacked. The size of the frame is determined by hall ceilings and proscenium openings.

A wide selection of widths is desirable on a large stage for box sets but for simple "border and wing with curtains" a uniform width of about 1 metre is sufficient provided that the flats are correctly placed to mask the "offstage" area. For such a purpose, six wing flats will usually be enough, three for each side.

LIGHTING

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PROPS

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AGEING A YOUNG PERSON

It is difficult to age effectively. Inexperienced players often overpaint the wrinkle lines and greying affects. Always err on the side of understatment.

All the lining must be done slowly and carefully, and with a steady hand. Lines should be drawn as thinly as possible. Fade off at the end of lines, blending in to the basic make-up — hard edges spoil the appearance.

Start by asking the player to wrinkle his face. This will reveal some of the

natural lines.

Each individual produces different lines as he frowns, so search out those that suggest age lines for that particular person especially around the eyes and mouth.
