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

Thanks for coming...

In attending this performance of the Melbourne Gang Show, you're participating in the continuing tradition of Gang Shows worldwide.

This is the occasion of our fortieth birthday show and we're just a little proud. However, 'Gang Shows' have a much larger, much longer heritage.

The first show that could reasonably be called a Gang Show was performed near London in 1929. The show was written, produced and directed by a character who was known, somewhat mysteriously, as 'A Holborn Rover'. The show was a huge success and transferred to larger and larger theatres. By 1934, the title had been established as the 'Gang Show'

The show was of such a high standard that London critics began to treat it as legitimate theatre. The mask of anonymity dropped from the 'Holborn Rover' and he was found to be Ralph Reader, who had already achieved success in the theatre in London and New York.

We are relative newcomers to the Gang Show. Our first performances were in 1953 at the Union Theatre, followed by annual shows at various venues such as Cathedral Hall, National Theatre, Princess Theatre and the Palais Theatre. Once having commenced we have never looked back.

Thousands of young people have participated in Gang Shows over the years and every one has been a star.

It would be churlish to pick out names and nominate particular people – the Gang Show has always been, before anything else, a co-operative effort. Everyone participates to his or her ability and no one can ask for more than that.

The key to our success, such as it has been, is your participation – you, the audience.

You may not realise it but the legions of Gang Show audiences now number well in their millions.

We thank you all – every one of you. It's been great to know you.

House of Raps

A comic send-up of our political leaders in Rap style. Do they rapresent us or are they too busy looking after themselves. A lively romp through the lower House of Government and its rapport with the electorate!

Not Cricket

The teenage cast were bowled over with the chance to face up to this sketch. The pitch is quick as we bounce along through this short innings.

Largo

Continuing the great tradition of a feature dance number. Detective Largo takes us through a strange case which is set in the alleys and night clubs of Manhattan. Cool and composed he confronts the underworld as love, lust and power surround this gripping tale.

Columbus

It is 500 years since Columbus sailed from Spain to find a route west to the Indies. Only now can we look back and critically analyse what this meant for the Americas, its people and indeed the world. Only now can we put the chain of events which followed into gripping perspective. Only now can we believe that history could dramatically repeat itself.

This epic sequence begins in the court of Queen Isabella in 1492. It takes us across the Atlantic as Columbus is threatened by mutiny, shows us the conflict between the civilised natives and invaders, moves us graphically through the torrid events which lead to the chilling climax on New Years Eve 1999.

We've got a Song to Sing

The main strength of Gang Shows is always the enthusiasm and enjoyment which is demonstrated by the younger members of the cast. In this special fortieth opening of the second act we pay tribute to those songs which have become favourites over the years.

Sawadee

A creative mime of our impressions of fascinating Thailand. A very different Gang Show item in the style of Phillipe Gentry puppetry which mixes shapes, movement and colours to create vivid images. From the jungle to the temples to the bustling cities Thailand this imaginative item has its own unique feeling which comes to life in this ingenious portrayal.

I Don't Want My Mother to Know

A romantic view of courting in the earlier part of this century. Our teenage cast spin back the years for a lighthearted look at the difficulties when boy meets girl in the 'good old days'.

Once Upon A...

Hilarious send up of fairy tales which all managed to happen in the same place at the same time. See if you can recognise all the characters some of whom have taken on modern ideas. Of course they all have to live happily ever after don't they?

Better Dead than Red


Comic look at the problems of ordinary guards living in some extraordinary times. Change is a challenge for our friends at the front.







TALES OF THAILAND

As the curtain came down on final night at the Palais last year the Melbourne season was over. Well not quite! Two weeks later the 175 strong Gang, including representatives from other shows, gathered at Tullamarine Airport to depart for Thailand to perform 11 shows in Bangkok and Chiangmai.

The invitation to do these shows came from the Scout Association of Thailand and followed on from our successful season touring the Philippines in 1988.

Many reservations were held about the show before we left Australia mainly due to the differences in our cultures. The greatest barrier was that English is not widely spoken by the majority of the population. Would the Gang Show style of performance work in Thailand?

We arrived safely in Bangkok and after acclimatising to the change in weather, we commenced some sightseeing and rehearsals.

No sooner had we arrived then it was off to Chiangmai by train. This gave us the opportunity to see the changing landscape of Thailand and more importunity interact with the local Scouts and Guides who met us at every station with beaming smiles, signs of welcome and food. Some had travelled four hours on foot to greet us. The frantic sight of badge swapping and the impromptu dancing made our journey a memorable one.

Once in Chiangmai it was off to the Culture Centre for our only dress rehearsal, (which turned into a preview show for the students of the college), and five shows in the six hundred seat theatre. Here we were visited by many dignitaries including the National Director of Arts who flew up from Bangkok to see the show. During breaks we had time to share more intimate moments with the local students. Will the Thais ever be the same after corrupting them with the chicken dance?

Following the shows we got to tour around the Mae Rim region in the mountains of Chiangmai.

On the itinerary were elephants, orchids, silk, silver and handcrafts, where we brought umbrellas and fans which can be seen in the show tonight.

We also had time to join in activities with the local scouts which included absailing, traditional cooking, obstacle courses along with demonstrations of Thai boxing and sword dancing.

On our last night in Chiangmai we were treated with a farewell Kantoke Dinner which was a show in itself with traditional dancing, fireworks and processions.

We left our new found friends and headed back to Bangkok with renewed confidence. Gang Show was a hit with the Thai people.

A rest day was then followed by an experience of a lifetime. The theatre we played in holds two thousand people and was built at a cost of sixty five million Australian dollars. It was majestic and no doubt the best theatre that has been performed in by any Gang Show in the would.

Six performances were given in Bangkok with the gala performance being attended by the Crown Princess of Thailand and the Australian Ambassador. Needless to say the adrenaline was running high and everyone was a little nervous but this could have had something to do with the many security guards backstage.

The Princess was so impressed with the show she sent a television crew to film the whole performance the next night.


With all the performances over, it was time to relax to do some more sightseeing and last minute shopping before we headed home.

During the two weeks in Thailand we had developed strong bonds not only with our hosts but also within the various scouting shows around Australia and there were many teary eyes as we said goodbye but not farewell to our new found friends.
