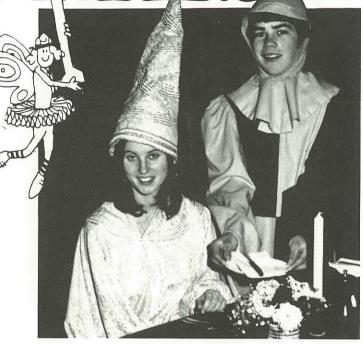
COSTUMIS

One Head of Costume Department, 50 Parents and Friends and 1,000 hours of work – mix them all together, sprinkle lightly with enthusiasm and what have you got – 1,500 new costumes for 1981 show.

To complement these new costumes we have drawn 2,500 items from previous shows. These are only part of the 20,000 pieces of costumery held in our store at Chadstone.

Because this is a special year we have tried to make authenticity our goal and that is where the headaches began – but for the "London" segment we have done it and the costumes will reflect those used in the original show.

When the curtain falls some of the items go back to that store but many are either hired to other shows or else join the country tour cast to highlight their performances.



IMAKIR-UP

During the course of an evening's show the cast disappear deep into the bowels of the theatre and reappear as completely different characters, all due to the talented people of the make-up team. There are many changes to many faces, so many changes that the team has to resort to mass production techniques at least for normal "straight" make-up.

Character parts like the Fairy Godmother, 2 Ugly Sisters, 3 Mice and 1 Rat, etc. in Cinderella this year require more attention but of course are fewer in number.

The 18 ODD Members of the make-up team work with a variety of mediums from Grease Paint, Liquid "Body" Make-up, Powder, Crepe Hair and Wigs to perform their task on over 100 Members of the cast each night and you will realise that it could be true to say pandemonium prevails but panic never.

The combined years experience of the makeup team is in excess of 60 years, sufficient proof that it's fun even though there are hectic moments.

Hectic moments like last years' African sequence where we changed quite a number of the cast to African Tribesmen and later in the show to South Americans with body makeup both required the cast to be quickly changed into straights for the following items.

We hope that while you are watching the items JUSTICE FOR ALL and DO-DA-DAY you will think of the hard work going on under the stage to change the cast back into "straights".

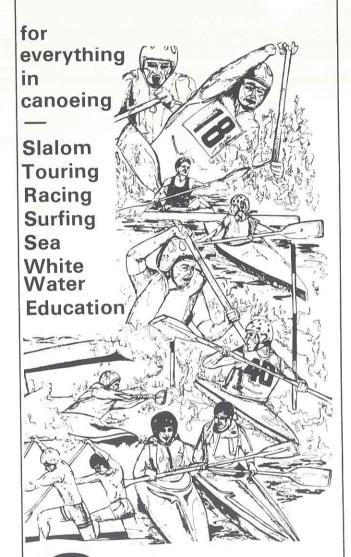

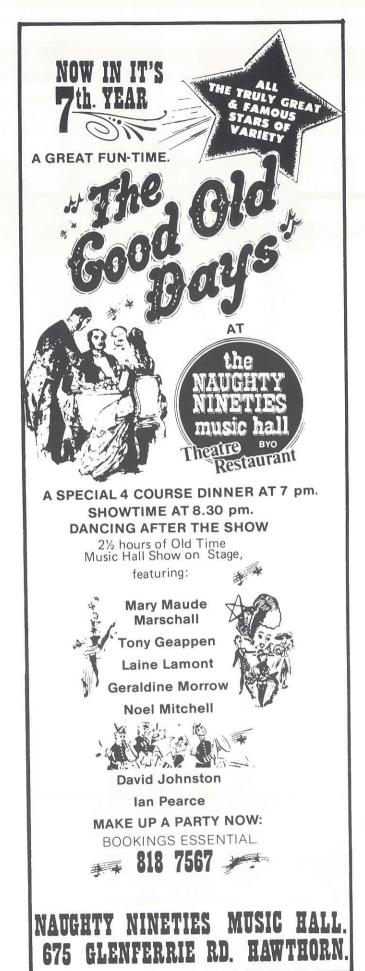

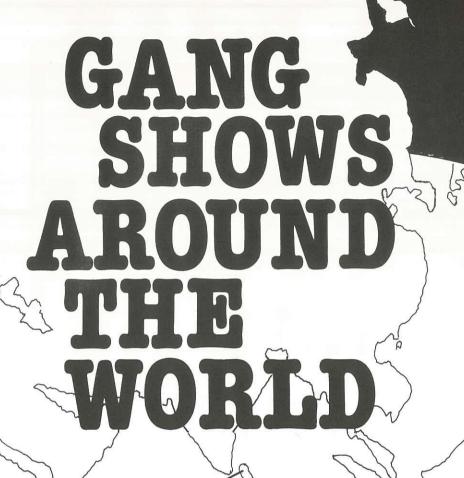

GANG SHOWS AROUND THE WORLD

The history of the Gang Shows around the world is of course far too mammoth a task to include in this programme.

However, looking at the pages on either side of this resume will give some indication of how many shows are in operation today.

The first 'Show' from which the Gang Shows draw their beginning was organised by Rover Scout, Ralph Reader. 'The Gangs All Here' ran for three nights at the Scala Theatre in London almost 50 years ago. The audiences were small and funds raised were used to build a swimming pool at the Downe campsite in Kent.

All of the material for the show was written by Ralph Reader who at that time was a well established actor, dancer and choreographer. Until 1936 he billed himself as 'A Holborn Rover' and only after that year did the many songs which are still being sung around the world today actually carry his name.

The first show was followed by the 'The Gang Comes Back' and this was such a success that new shows began around England and Scotland. In 1935, Ralph made the generous decision to give the rights to all his material to the Scout Association.

The Gang Show has only been interrupted in its performances by the Second World War in 1939 when no London Show was conducted. Wartime shows did however entertain troops through Europe, Africa, Asia and Burma.

The London Gang Show was reestablished in 1950 and continued on until 1974 when Ralph reader retired at the age of 71.

The first Melbourne Show was a Headquarters organised Ralph Reader musical entitled, 'We'll Live Forever', a stage play centered around the activities of a Scout Group. The cast was drawn from throughout Melbourne and ultimately created the nucleus of the Melbourne Gang Show

The 1953 season ran for ten days at the Union Theatre and played to an audience of 500. This was small compared to later venues of the Cathedral Hall with 700 and now the Palais with seating for 3,000. The first shows had great difficulty filling the theatres and it required quite a deal of effort to bolster those early days.

The earlier shows also tended to religiously follow the London show which produced problems with lack of identification to songs and sketches related to British scenes and personalities.

In 1955 the idea of country touring shows was introduced by the Gangsters. Country tours now incorporate some of the main cast members of the Melbourne Show capabley supported by local talent.

The 'Gang of 1960' hit the floorboards in that year when the use of the Gang Show title was withdrawn due to the use of local Australian material. In 1961 rationality prevailed and once again the Show became the Melbourne Gang Show. 1960 was also the year the show moved to the Palais theatre – not without certain problems as the sets had already been designed for a smaller theatre. This show was one of the few failures and tickets were given away in an attempt to fill the theatre.

Following the introduction of a professional Public Relations consultant audiences doubled in the next year. Audiences have continued to increase and the Show has regularly had to stage extra performances.

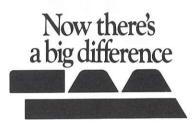
1968 saw the introduction of girls into the cast thus allowing much greater flexibility in songs and sketches. Girls had previously assisted in off-stage roles but not in cast. Some light-hearted dressing up in the guise of the opposite gender still goes on however the contribution afforded to the cast by the girls is now well established.

The days of the early Gang Shows will not be forgotten. Today's Gang Show is a highly professional and polished performance with a budget and an enthusiasm which increases each year.

This year we have had the opportunity to review some of the best from 50 years of Gang Show – next year, and the next and so on will bring us more good times and good shows to remember.

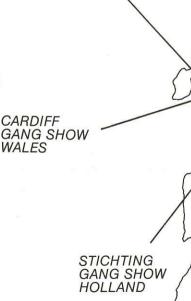

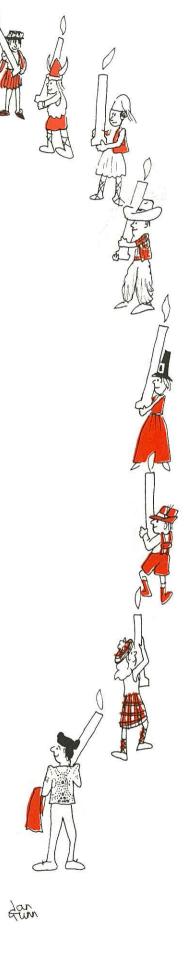

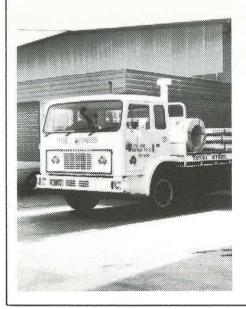

LIGHTS

This year the lighting department has the mammoth task of lighting the large scenery sets and the 130 cast members. To do this specialised job, they use 150 lanterns across six flying bars, ladders, booms and front of house lighting positions. All these lanterns are being controlled from the rear stalls on a duet microprocessor memory-controlled switchboard with the use of one hundred and ninety eight lighting cues.

This job is being undertaken by the small team of six people including the department head, Andrew Holmes. With the aid of the Palais staff who operate the three follow spots and switchboard we are sure you will enjoy the visual effects produced by this technical team.

SOUND

The output from 40 mikes, mixed, balanced, amplified and projected from three sound control consoles within the stalls backstage and in the orchestra pit provides the magical sound we now associate with the Gang Show.



Additional features provided by this department include pre-recorded sound effects, back stage broadcast for cast members cues and the all important recording of the show to provide the Gang Show cassette to enable the audience to relive the thrilling sounds of Gang Show – don't miss your copy.

Once you've got the whole show on stage – the scenery, costumes, props and lights – it's starting to look pretty good, but it's lacking those final touches that make it a really polished performance.



This is where special effects come in. A hardworking team of five imaginative guys have the task of adding all the extra bits and pieces that brighten up the show. Tell them what you want done and chances are they'll be able to come up with it, whether it's campfires or London fog - or even rainbows. Some of the more challenging problems facing the special effects team this year included making realistic-looking street-lamps that could be "lit" by realistic looking lamplighters, and a soot-filled fire-place capable of self-destruction, as well as the normal everyday run-of-the-mill explosions and smoke clouds . . . and the fog? That comes from way down in the bowels of the theatre where a huge behemouth full of dry ice pours out enough mist to cover the stage (one year it engulfed the orchestra and the first three rows!). Special effects is just a small part of the show, but a vital one. It's just one of the many teams without which Gang Show simply wouldn't be Gang Show.

Apart from the satisfaction of watching the girls in their care develop into responsible and active citizens, they have the added enjoyment of adult company, social outings, the opportunity to travel and to try varied activities.

Our 8 point programme covers – Thinking for yourself, learning new arts and crafts, giving service in the community, exploring the out-of-doors and caring for the environment, home craft skills, health, fitness and beauty, making new friends, both here and overseas, and putting the Guide Law into practise.

Each year, many thousands of girls are denied these pleasures due to a lack of adult leaders. If you are female, 15 years of age or over, and enjoy being with girls, there is a place waiting for you in the Girl Guide Movement.

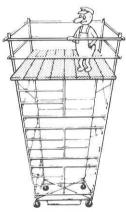

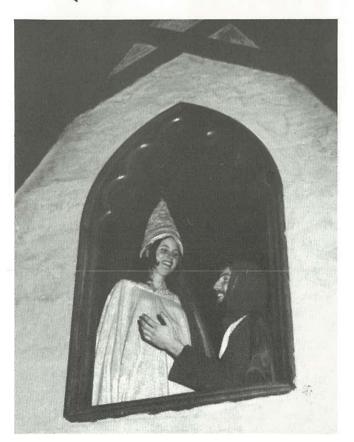

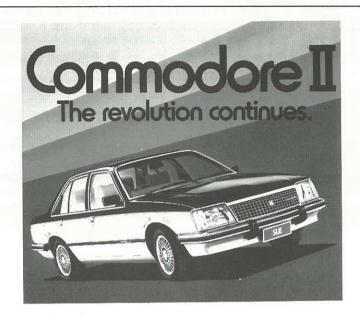
