It is important to note that credit accounts should be paid as soon as possible after the account from Headquarters is received, for it is important to keep, as far as possible, an even cash flow for Headquarters to work on.

The night before, Mum and I had gone over every single thing about 10 times, pressed out every tiniest crease, practised going down steps in those rather alarming high heels, and I had curtsied to Mum, curtsied to Dad, curtsied to my kid sister - if the milkman had called round, I swear I'd have curtsied to him just for practice!

So much had happened since Mum said I could be a deb. at our first Senior Branch Ball. There was the business of persuading Jeff to be my partner, choosing a pattern and material for Mum to make my frock, borrowing long white gloves, going to practices to meet the other girls and their partners and to learn what we had to do, trying out different hair styles every night until Dad started hammering on the bathroom door; then two days ago the final rehearsal actually at the Palais . . . and now tonight was The Night, and all I had to do was tear to the hairdresser after work and then go home and get dressed and leave for the Ball!

Somehow it all got done. We all got to the Palais early and, of course, there weren't many people there, and inside me I felt suddenly sure no one was going to come and it was all going to be a terrible flop . . . and then I saw the big Guide Badge and the banks of blue and gold flowers and the flags and all the tables decorated, and I knew people would come and sit at them and they would be Rangers and Cadets and Guiders and people who were all my friends, and I was going to be proud instead of frightened — and that's just how it was.

The next thing I remember was when it was suddenly my turn, and the other girls all said "Good luck!" and the curtains parted and there was that long, long walk ahead of me. But Jeff was waiting for me, and there was a reassuring smile from Mrs. Rylah at the other end, and suddenly I felt, "Why, there's nothing to worry about at all!" and all the butterflies were still at last. For me, and I think for all the debs., it was the most wonderful night of our lives, and we wanted it to go on for ever. We want to thank the Ball Committee for all their help and encouragement and moral support and for the beautiful bouquets they gave us to carry, and to thank the Senior Branch Committee for the surprise we found waiting for us when we went back to our tables — a little drop pearl necklet on a silver chain to commemorate our debut.

The Swedish Y.W.C.A. Guides and Y.M.C.A. SANGAM — OUR NEW ASIAN WORLD CENTRE

The following is a letter from Mrs. Woollacott, organiser of the "Sangam" Patrol Challenge, sent to 652 Companies throughout Victoria in July:—

"As I write this for 'Matilda', I am just bursting with joy because to date 234 Companies have accepted my challenge and sent in £270/0/1 for Sangam. This result is beyond my wildest dreams! When I talked over my idea with the rest of the Committee

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we agreed that this would introduce Sangam to every Guide in Victoria - we also agreed that it would remind every Guide of some of the deeper things that Guiding stands for, like doing things for others, sharing what we've got with people who have not got something, being unselfish and spending money on other people rather than over themselves, etc. I really did NOT expect the Guides to have much pocket money to spare, and I estimated an average of about 5/- per Company. So you can see why this result has given me so much pleasure - by simple arithmetic you can see for yourselves that it works out at more than £1 per Company!


"I have not sent receipts because that would mean hundreds of 5d. stamps, but any Company that wants a receipt can send me a stamped addressed envelope and I'll send a receipt with pleasure. The list printed below is a 'thank you' acknowledgement that your money has been received. Another thing I haven't done is to put the amount each Company sent in - you are probably sorry about this, as you are curious and want to know if you were the best or not. Do you know WHY we are not publishing the amounts? Well, here are just two reasons, and I have received dozens like these: 'I enclose a postal note for 7/6. I really am sorry it is so little, but at the moment we only have five Guides in our new Company.' Well, that was a wonderful response, I thought. On the other hand, a Company wrote and said they hadn't done the Patrol Challenge, but had held a social - showed slides and served supper - and they were very happy to send me a cheque for £7/10/-. I was happy to receive it, and I'm sure that Company worked hard. Many thanks. However, I had put in the instructions to the P.Ls. that it wasn't the amount of money so much as the way the Guides put their Laws into practice to help build Sangam that was to count, so I will end by quoting a third Company that sent in 9/2 with the following information:-

BROWNIES' GOOD TURN

Despite a steady drizzle of rain, members of the 1st Wodonga Brownie Pack assembled at the Wodonga District Hospital to carry out a good turn in conjunction with the Golden Anniversary of their Movement.

The girls planted two "Sutters Gold" standard roses (one from the members of the Pack and one from Guides who had been members of the Brownies) in the first of the new rose beds at the hospital.

At the commencement of the simple planting ceremony, Brown Owl explained to the assembled Board members, patients, staff and visitors that the Brownies began on 30th May, 1914, then being called "Rosebuds".

"Throughout the world flower good turns are being done by the Brownies to celebrate our 50th anniversary. We chose Wodonga Hospital as the place for our planting because of the joy it could bring to patients, staff and visitors."

Bronwyn Hartwig and Gail Furze planted the two roses for their fellow-Brownies and ex-Brownies. Mr. B. Cox, President of the Board of Management of the hospital, thanked the Brownies for their thoughtful and generous gesture in starting off the hospital's new rose planting project.

"Already a number of other organisations and individuals have promised donations of standard roses for our new beds, and we hope shortly to be able to plant out the whole seven beds. In years to come you will be able to look at the lovely golden blooms from your plants and remember the good deed you have carried out here today for the hospital."

Sister O'Farrell, on behalf of the staff, also expressed her sincere thanks to the Brownies for their lovely thought, and particularly for their fine roll-up in spite of the rain.

A plaque was erected adjacent to the two roses to commemorate the occasion.

The Brownies then distributed bouquets of flowers in the hospital wards.

Dear "Matilda",

In your June issue I noticed the name of a former British Chief Scout spelt Lord "Summers" instead of the correct spelling of "Somers". As Lord Somers was a former Governor of Victoria who, during his term of office, gave much support to Scouting, and as his wife was a very active State Commissioner who made a very valuable contribution to our own Movement, it seems desirable that Guides should know the correct spelling of this name. Guides may be interested to link "Somers Camp", the establishment of which came from Lord Somers' suggestion, with a former Chief Scout showing his wide interest in all youth welfare. Considerable surprise (even horror!) was expresseed at the recent L.A. Conference when, speaking in answer to a question, I stated that Epping District, new in Guiding, felt it necessary to provide complete uniforms for six Guiders and initial expenses (approximately £5 each) for commencing Brownie Packs and Guide Company. I should add that the L.A. had also completely equipped the District Commissioner and continue to pay all her expenses except the petrol for the use of her car (which she uses extensively for Guiding activities). All training fees and expenses for the Commissioner and Guiders were also provided.

I feel that if other L.As. were to take on a similar programme the task of the District Commissioner would be made much easier, as she would not have so much trouble recruiting suitable Guiders if they or their husbands were not to be out of pocket.

All this has not been easy for us, as we have had to work quite hard, but we have had a lot of fun doing it, become firm friends, and I feel we have come nearer to knowing that intangible "mystique of Guiding" (to quote Mrs. Curtis-Otter).

The Guide Company and Brownie Packs themselves are now able to "stand on their own feet", but feel that our initial assistance was vital in an area where there had been no previous "Guiding image". New L.As., asking for advice on this matter, should take a realistic view and, according to their own circumstances, give as much assistance as possible according to current needs.

PLAN EVERGREEN ENCORE

We all knew that PLAN EVERGREEN wouldn't just stop at the end of 1963, because our trees would keep on growing and still need care at times. So many Guides and Brownies, too, wanted to continue working for the Evergreen Badge that it has been extended to the end of this year.

Then came the exciting news of the gift of £1000 from the Herald-Sun Pty. Ltd. to PLAN EVERGREEN. This money is now available for grants to Guide Units undertaking projects in line with the aims of our original plan.

A Unit — which may be a Patrol, Company, Pack, District, etc. — should make written application for a grant, giving details of the project and the amount of financial assistance required.

In allocating this money preference will be given to projects involving Guides and Brownies in caring for the countryside in some practical way, such as

- -setting up and looking after wildflower sanctuaries (grant could be used to pay for fencing)
- -tree-planting (cost of trees, wooden stakes, tree-guards and preparation of the ground where necessary)
- -keeping the countryside tidy (litterbugs, rubbish bins, paint, etc.)

At the same time consideration will be given to projects which stimulate a love of the outdoors and train children to this end. For example,

-- improvement of campsites and land around Guide Halls

- --purchase of books and magazines on wildlife and bushcraft for Guide libraries
- -additional Pack and Company equipment to encourage interest in outdoor activities.

Applications will be considered by the PLAN EVERGREEN Committee in the first week of each month, commencing in September, and this will continue until 30th June, 1965, unless the fund is exhausted before that date.

CAMPCRAFT WEEKEND — JANET WHITLAM SITE

We arrived on Saturday morning to find many Rangers still cooking breakfast, and it was a very pleasant sight to see the tents and the smoke from the fires amongst the trees.



Camp commenced at 10.30 a.m. with Colours — and then we were divided into two groups for the various sessions. The first session was tent pitching; after being shown the correct way to pitch and strike a tent, we were split into groups to do it ourselves. After the tents were pitched, the G.I.C. came round to have a look and showed us what we had done wrong. Then we were allowed to strike the tents, and as it was getting near lunchtime they were struck in record time!

After lunch we had a session on gadgets, and that old favourite, square lashing, was brushed up. Next, camp first-aid, and the more experienced Rangers showed us their lightweight first-aid kits. These kits amazed the very new Rangers — to see the size these kits can be made with just a little thought and common sense.

We were then shown the correct way to handle a tomahawk and axe, but we could not persuade the demonstrator to chop enough wood (as examples) for all the cooking fires!

After dinner — and before Campfire — one of the more experienced lightweight camping Rangers showed us her pack and how she managed to keep weight down. Again it showed what a little thought and common sense can do.

Then on to Campfire. We all had to bring an entrance fee before we were allowed in! This fee consisted of two logs of wood from each Ranger to keep the campfire going. Our G.I.C., Miss Smith, led the Campfire, and we all enjoyed ourselves and, of course, learnt one or two new songs.

We were then invited by the Guiders to supper in the Equipment Hut, and what a supper, served Geisha style by very glamorous Guider Geisha girls! Although they were a little slow getting started, and had to be hurried just a bit, supper was worth waiting for!

Next morning, after Colours, we were shown how to erect screening. What fun you can have trying to put clovehitches in ropes, and erecting the screening, only to find the hitches are in the wrong places!

Fires and cooking were next, and the Guiders cooked lightweight meals just to show how it was done. Then they sat down and commenced their meal whilst we starved.

Our last session was on tent mending. Very small stitches and plenty of patience is needed for this, and we resolved that in future we would be extra careful with our tents.


After camp was struck, and Rangers dressed for travelling, Colours were lowered, and we started making our way home after an enjoyable weekend.

HANDCRAFTS

Ways to make the work fun for the Brownies include—

- Showing an article already made, if a little complicated; also the steps in its making. (These can be passed on to the children who are not over-keen on handwork in a way that makes them want to finish the arficle and, when finished, feel that they have done most of it.)
- Keeping articles within the bounds of the ability of the average child in the Pack, but at the same time calling for a little effort. Not spoiling the article by scrimping or using poor material, but at the same time showing the children how to use their ingenuity by using good second-hand material or non-expensive things.

Allowing each Brownie her own choice.

Showing her how to save and not waste. Have all equipment ready to start.

- Choosing a suitable place to work good light, plenty of space, table if possible — clean.
- Teaching Brownies to care for and share tools.

Allowing time for tidying away.

- Giving enough time for the child to either finish the article or gain satisfaction from what she has done.
- Not too much adult advice from the Guiders. Brownies would rather find out for themselves.

Handwork activities help-

development of dexterity,

- development of skills useful to themselves and others,
- development of a sense of beauty of colour and line,
- an outlet for their imagination and ingenuity,
- the use of their natural creativeness and its further development,
- development of accuracy and neatness (neither items are natural characteristics),

development of concentration,

development of perseverence, but we cannot ask too much from the child, and we may need to create the incentive.

When the article is finished the child will experience a wonderful thrill of achievement and gain a little more confidence in herself.

"KITAI" OFFICIAL OPENING CEREMONY

Saturday, 11th April, was a very special day in the history of Guiding in Sale, for it marked the official opening of our Guide Hall "Kitai", by Senior Branch Adviser, Mrs. A. Rylah.

It was a day of perfect sunshine, and over 200 people (including visitors from Bendigo, Melbourne, Pakenham, Morwell and Bairnsdal) joined with Sale Guides for the ceremony.

In his address, the Mayor of Sale (Cr. J. Leslie) spoke of the need for more support of the L.A. and praised its members for the wonderful work accompalished.

A representative from each of the two Companies then unveiled a commemorative plaque as Mrs. Rylah unlocked the door.

Following her into the hall, the guests signed the Visitors' Book, inspected the building and enjoyed the afternoon tea arranged by the L.A.

Mrs. Rylah planted a Weeping Eugenia in the hall grounds. This tree has a special significance, for it is a seedling from the large tree growing at the front of Guide House.

STORY OF A PORT (continued from Page 63)

One of the projects in the present 10-year development is to remove oil berths out of the main nevigational channel to the area developed in 1950 for the handling of modern tanker ships.

A completely redesigned and reconstructed breakwater pier, originally built in 1860, was opened as an oil terminal in 1950, and in 1963 the 104-year-old reconstructed Gellibrand Pier was opened as a super tanker terminal for ships up to 95,000 d.w. tons.

As ships changed from sail to steam, cargo handling methods changed on ship and shore, so the port changed its facilities.

1959 saw the first stern-loading vehicle ship introduced on the Australian coast, and port facilities were supplied in a new area adjacent to the river entrance. More wharves are being converted to cater for the new methods. Reconstruction is made in the light of clearly defined new trends.

The port of today was built on the solid foundations of the port of the past, and the port of tomorrow will be built equally solidly on the foundations of today.

Ships will continue to change in basic design, cargo methods will alter, but modern society in Victoria will still be as dependent on the service provided by the port as the tiny isolated settlement responsible for its birth.


WAVERLEY DIVISION REVELS


