From our State Commissioner



BROWNIE GUIDE INTEREST BADGES



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

Remember all the lucky girls who won their Sections at the State Finals of "Encore '78"? The next step was the National Finals (non-competitive) in Brisbane and all 83 girls immediately explored ways and means of earning money for air fares. Each girl was advised that she would have to provide \$75, while the committee undertook to find the balance. The girls raised the money in a variety of ways, e.g., the Warrnambool Brownies conducted a "Good-deed-a-thon"; Glenroy Guides collected, washed and sold used Vegemite jars; one group collected and sold garden compost, while service clubs (Rotary, Lions) also gave assistance.

The guides, ranger guides and most of the rangers flew to Brisbane on Monday, 28th August, while the brownies and the rest of the rangers travelled on Wednesday. For many girls it was their first flight and there was much excitement. All girls were billeted privately and many new friendships were made.

The Queensland Committee had arranged outings to Lone Pine Sanctuary and the Gold Coast for the girls, who came from all parts of Australia. Unfortunately, sunny Queensland could only produce rain on these days, but the warmth of fellowship and good fun was always there.

Victoria was invited to open the first concert on Friday night, and we were all very proud indeed to watch our girls on stage. Tasmania, Western Australia and Queensland also appeared on Friday night, while New South Wales, South Australia and more Queensland items had their turn on Saturday night. The overall standard was extremely high and large audiences enjoyed the concerts. Each participant was presented with an "Encore '78" metal badge and a sample bag from the Queensland Committee.

Before we all went our separate ways on Sunday, a very moving Guide's Own was held in a park (the sun decided to relent and shone brightly). Girls from all States took a part in this service one of our Glenroy guides read a prayer. Too soon it was time for us to board the bus taking us to the airport, the entire Victorian contingent travelling home on one plane.

A very big BRAVO to the Queensland Committee for staging such a memorable event, with such humour and friendship.

COMMONWEALTH **COMMISSIONERS' CONFERENCE**

The Commonwealth Girl Guide Commissioners' Conference took place in the United Kingdom from 21st to 25th August, 1978. It was held at 'Fox-lease', the Commonwealth Training Centre in Hampshire, and was attended by delegates from 36 countries.

Australia was represented by the Chief Commissioner, Mrs R. Renshaw Jones, O.B.E.

The Conference was chaired by the Commonwealth Chief Commissioner, Mrs. Owen Walker, and discussions emphasised the fact that the individual Guide Associations in 53 Commonwealth countries comprise a total membership of over 11/2 million girls in five continents. The strength of the Girl Guide-Girl Scout Movement throughout the world today exceeds seven million members.

It was resolved that every effort should be made to make better known to Commonwealth Governments, educational and youth agencies, the important role which is performed by the Girl Guides Association in each country. Each is a recognised non-governmental organisation and plays an integral part in all matters concerning the informal education of young people and community service.

Renewed efforts are to be made to strengthen Commonwealth links, to increase awareness of the Commonwealth, and for each country to achieve greater understanding of other Commonwealth countries.

Mrs Renshaw Jones comments that

"On three occasions we were able to spend time with the girls — the focal point of all our Conferences and endeavours. By individual invitation we dined at patrol or company camps in the grounds; were joined by representatives for the opening and conduct of our Commonwealth Market (where souvenirs, pamphlets, curios, were sold or given away) and, finally, shared a superb camp fire on the Foxlease lawn. In addition, Guides and Rangers (in impeccable uniform) gave service in the dining room by carrying food and clearing dishes."

and

"Two aspects especially impressed me - firstly, the women of initiative and intelligence who expressed themselves so ably - this was particularly noticeable in some younger women in the newly independent countries. A number were teachers, a few were wives of leading politicians, one the wife of a Chief Justice, another a member of the Judiciary, one an eye specialist; many held full-time jobs in addition to being wives and mothers. The interests, hobbies and community service in which they are involved is boundless.

Secondly, the sisterhood and cameraderie which showed in so many ways - to the Chief Commissioner of Cyprus whose luggage was lost without trace en route - to the Chief Commissioner of Kenya, so deeply sorrowing at the death of her country's President Kenyatta. The way countries in adjacent areas of the world (near neighbours) combined — not as a "clique" but sometimes man-oeuvring their less "forthcoming" sisters to the right place at the right time with a little reminder. The exchange of information, etc., between the larger independent Associations, the newly independent Associations and the Branch Associations a sharing of, and interest in, problems, ideas. solutions, suggestions.

One of woman's important roles was highlighted by the presence of the one-month-old son of the Chief Commissioner of the New Hebrides and when "mum" was last at meals or arrived late for a session, we all understood that "junior's" feed times had to take precedence. There was never any lack of nurses to cuddle the chuckling, dark-eyed Andrew."

If October has "crept up" on you — perhaps you could find a good World Atlas and discover a country that does not belong to W.A.G.G.G.S. and try to find out something about the children of THAT country.

That will be a good start for 1979, which is a very special year, THE INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF THE CHILD, when the whole world will be thinking and planning to make the life of every child in the world as wonderful as yours is! Perhaps one of you will think of a special way to help children. Remember it was the bright idea of one little brownie which resulted in thousands and thousands of dollars of gift "Ice-creams for the Chief", which Olave, Lady Baden-Powell with her unfailing generosity and love gave to help so many Guiding projects in the less privileged countries. It could be YOUR idea which is chosen for the Australian project.

Australia's National Co-ordinator is Senator the Hon. Margaret Guilfoyle, Minister of Social Security.

In Victoria, our State Co-ordinator is the Hon. Walter Jona, M.P., Minister of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs and Assistant Minister of Health. The State Chairman is Dr Anthony Clements, Director of Infant Health. He will head a committee of approximately 20 members representative of organisations working closely with and for children. You will be glad to know that the Girl Guides Association is one of them.

You will read and hear much more about this International Year of the Child as time goes by but, please, as you start planning for your own Thinking Day on 22nd February, start planning too for every day of 1979, remembering what our Founder, Lord Baden-Powell said: "When you think you are looking wide, look wider still".

Two commissioners from each country are invited, although, if space permits, extra delegates may be accepted.


Home hospitality is offered throughout bus tour and before and after to fit in with delegate's travel.

SANGAM — PROGRESS IN THE FARM AND GARDEN

Much has been accomplished in the farm and garden at Sangam. An area of land was levelled, free-of-charge, by the Military Engineering College, and a variety of crops is being cultivated. Coconut trees and coffee plants are being grown on an experimental basis.

Heavy rains produced an abundant harvest. The vegetables grown are used in the house, and any surplus is sold. Profits from the sales go towards kitchen expenses. The staff now intend to keep a cow, and chickens.

New equipment for the farm includes a water storage tank, donated by the Girl Guides' Association of New Zealand, and a water spray from the Bureau of Agriculture.

TRAINING PAGES

Have you ever made PAPE

A great activity for your Unit . . . why not plan to make your own paper for Christmas Cards?

Equipment

1 container in which to mix paper, blotting paper, rolling pin, hand mixer (I use my husband's power drill with the paint stirring attachment), iron, fly-wire mesh and some lengths of 1/2" square wood; two lengths of string and paper of any colour.

Method

Step 1. Measure the top of your container and make a frame slightly larger, from the $\frac{1}{2}$ " square wood.

Step 2. With small nails tack the fly-wire mesh to the TOP of the frame, carefully trimming off the excess wire with scissors.

Fasten the string on two sides of the frame to make handles.

Making Pulp

1. Put paper in container, add water and mix with hand mixer — or other — until paper has 'dissolved'.

2. Drain the pulp stock through the wire mesh frame, mixing gently with the water to disperse the fibres evenly. (Do this outside or over sink please.)

3. Place a sheet of blotting paper on top of the mat of fibres and **gently** roll with rolling pin, squeezing out excess moisture. Peel off blotting paper and the sheet will adhere to it.

4. Now place a dry blotter on top of the sheet and iron with a warm iron (set iron for 'cotton') until completely dry. Remove the top sheet of blotter and peel off your self-made sheet of paper.

Good luck with your paper making !!!


Stencils

4. The cut-out pieces can be laid on the cards and spatter painted with ink or an old toothbrush rubbed over a comb.


5. Make designs using potato shapes, tops of cotton reels, etc.



Coloured Foil


Fold foil and cut shapes.

Paste to cards and press designs with blunt pencil.




Pop-up Cards

Cut-Out and Stand


Push tree through to inside and colour. Glue another card to the outside and decorate.



P.S.: I hope there are not too many mistakes in this letter — I went to quite the best fly college in the country. It was most select.





DO

- sit the patient down
- clean the affected area under cold running water if possible
- apply a small amount of antiseptic cream if necessary
- cover the area with a band-aid or similar dressing if required.

- · leave a cut untreated
- apply dry cotton wool as part of the dressing
- leave a damp or soiled band-aid dressing unchanged.

Then a telephone call came from Tanzania with a faint and slightly wobbly young voice on the other end. Things were not easy in East Africa and comfort and courage are hard to send over thousands of miles of very poor connections. Sleep was short in our house, I can tell you, until a perkier call came a few days later.

Now she is safely home again, thinner and browner and so very, very glad that she went. The constant stream of letters arriving from Tanzania, Zambia and Norway testify that others are very glad also.

We are immensely proud of her — proud of the way she grew so quickly in her understanding of the immense problems facing this poverty-stricken emerging black nation, and proud of the love she gave to and received from so many people in the name of Guiding.

And she is just one!

At lunch-time the same day another ranger-guide left Tullamarine alone for Portugal and that night a guide from Tasmania passed through on her way to England. Norway, Sweden, Austria and Taiwan also will see our Victorian girls as ambassadors for Guiding and Australia this year.

Support your daughter in her Guiding at whatever age level, help her to understand its aims and to realise that she is part of a worldwide sisterhood and encourage her to make it all come alive when the opportunity presents later in her years as a guide and ranger.

COUNTRY DANCE BADGE

Recently I received a letter from a country guider asking for help in finding dances which fitted the various formations required.

Not being a dance specialist, I sought the help of the Education Department Physical Education section. I was referred to a book which I feel would help any guider who wished, with her guides, to explore country dancing, whether for the badge or just for fun. It explains, with diagrams, the various formations and steps, then gives direction for seventy-seven dances.

In the badge syllabus reference is made to "round whole-set" and "round progressive" formations, whereas the book has single and double circle formation. A Physical Education teacher's opinion is that circle formations would be suitable — the "round progressive" being those where partners changed.

This useful book is "Folk Dance Directions", Standard 2 to Form 2, by the Physical Education Branch of the Department of Education, New Zealand. I obtained my copy from "Allans", 276 Collins Street, Melbourne.

OVERNIGHT STAYS AND EXCHANGE VISITS

Please note: Brownie and Guide Guiders.

With the introduction of the P.O. and R. ruling which allows warranted guiders without camping/ holiday qualifications to have two "overnight stays" per annum, it may help to interpret the difference between "local" overnight stays and visits involving travel outside the unit's district.

For units to stay overnight in a local guide hall, a guider's house or similar, requires comparatively simple arrangements and the completion of a form (Group Accommodation) which checks such things as suitable adult supervision, parent permission, cooking, washing and toilet facilities are adequate. This form is to be in the hands of the district commissioner at least 14 days before the "overnight" stay. Forms are available through district commissioners.

When a unit plans to visit another town or exchange visits with a country or metropolitan unit, more detailed planning is needed. For these events guidelines have been produced which guiders can adapt to the type of visit planned. If practical, up to three months forward planning is suggested. For this type of stay a form (Single Accommodation) is available for "billeting in private homes", or if staying as a group in a hall or home, the form (Group Accommodation) described for "overnight stays" is required.

A guider who is uncertain which procedure she should follow can discuss her plans with her district commissioner or adviser.

Fire Danger

During summer, campfires and barbecues are busy providing food, fun and fellowship for hundreds of campers.

But is YOUR campfire or Pack Holiday barbecue really safe?

• Do you thoroughly clear leaves, twigs, grass or other flammable material from the area around the fireplace?

• Is it clear overhead?

• Is it well away from trees, logs, stumps, tents, undergrowth, buildings?

• Are you ALL fully aware of fire regulations in your area — at ALL times of the year?

• Are your fire buckets and wet bags in place BEFORE you even start to build your fireplace?

• Does EVERYONE know how to use a wet bag properly in emergency?

• Does EVERYONE know your fire emergency plans — where to go, what to do, how to act?

• Do the local authorities (police, hospital, etc.) KNOW you are in camp?

• Have you a telephone number for local brigade and quick access to a telephone?

• Is your fire or stove completely out when you leave on a hike?

Since much of our camping is in bushland or grassy areas, extreme care must be exercised with ALL types of fire.

Kerosene lanterns are defined by Fire Regulations as a "fire within a fireplace". As such they are illegal on Total Fire Ban days. Since such days are dangerously dry, the hazard of an overturned lantern is obvious.

Gas appliances are coming into more frequent use, particularly in summer.

These also are illegal on Total Fire Ban days, and the same precautionary measures as with open fires, should be applied when using gas at any time of the year.

The only legal barbecue on a Total Ban day is an **electric** one.

The use of gas appliances within tents or marquees requires great caution and should be avoided wherever possible.

OCTOBER, 1978

Fire shelters over open fires or wood stoves can be equally hazardous.


A gas appliance CANNOT be used in a tent or marquee on Total Fire Ban days. It can only be used in a solid shelter, e.g., timber, stone, brick, having at least three walls and a roof.

Fire Prevention cannot be too strongly emphasised in our work with guides and brownies.

Apart from the damage and destruction to countryside, stock and property — the danger to young lives in OUR care is something we must always remember.

From many years experience as the wife of a firefighter, I can say the horror of fire injuries is something which can never be forgotten.

Somewhere I have read that the Chief Guide wrote over two hundred letters of acknowledgement just in the first week after the notices appeared. It is possible that some readers of Matilda are not aware that it was only because two people cancelled their booking at the very last minute that Olave Soames and her father were passengers, as was B.P., on the R.M.S. Arcadian which sailed for Jamaica early in January, 1912. The Chief Guide gave many details of their early meetings in her book 'Window on my Heart', and the logbooks gave many more.

B.P. was usually Chairman of the Committee for Sports and Amusements when he travelled, and on this voyage Juliette Low, as well as Miss Olave Soames, was also on the committee. In the programme of the Ship's Concert, she is mentioned as being in a quartet with B.P. when they sang 'Sweet and Low'. The logbook had a copy of a poem by B.P. entitled 'Bewitched' with mention of 'Bulgy eyes' and 'Stitches', and those of you who have read 'Window on my Heart' will remember Lady B.P.'s references to these words as being some of the 'secret language' they used while their engagement was still a closely guarded secret. I was particularly interested to see this, as one of the more satisfying aspects of the work as archivist is coming across isolated facts which connect with other known facts to make the whole story fuller.

The engagement was announced on 20th September, and they made their first appearance together in public the following day, when the Chief Scout inspected a yacht which had been given to the Sea Scouts. Soon reporters let their imaginations run riot in descriptions of the forthcoming wedding. I saw many news cuttings saying how the wedding would be in Dorsetshire with a large guard of honour of Boy Scouts - a great ceremonial with the bride and groom inspecting large numbers of scouts — a large congregation including many Army and Naval men. As many readers know, the wedding actually took place very quietly indeed, with no guard of honour at all, though there was one scout present. Marguerite de Beaumont tells about this in her book "World Adventure" when Lady B.P. was in France helping

in a Recreation hut — "one of the men spoke to Lady B.-P. and offered his left hand, explaining with great pride that he was a scout and had been at her wedding. She was much surprised and even incredulous over this statement, as their wedding at Parkstone four years before had been quite a private affair. However, the young fellow then explained that he had been passing St. Peter's Church on his bicycle at that exact time that day and looked in to see what was going on. He then realised to his delight that the bridegroom was the Chief Scout, so he remained quietly at the back of the church until the service was over."

There was a description in the logbook of one of the groom's presents to the bride — "a Moorish leather glove box with replicas of all the Scout badges Miss Soames had qualified for, and in the design was a message in Morse". The wedding present from the Scouts was officially presented to the Baden-Powells on the 17th May, 1913 (the anniversary of the Relief of Mafeking) by the Duke of Connaught; it was a 20 h.p. Standard landaulette car, and there is a picture of it in 'Window on my Heart'.
