A special thank you also to our International Planning Committee who organised the presentation of the International night.

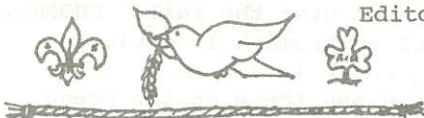

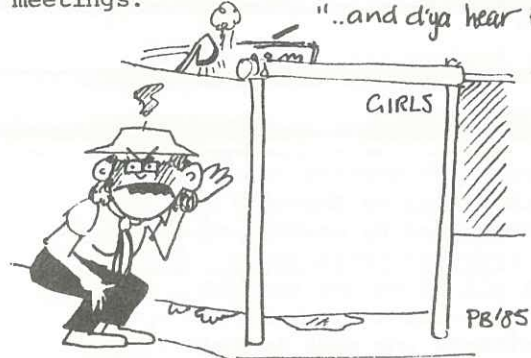

This really bothered me and I questioned the Lord about it.

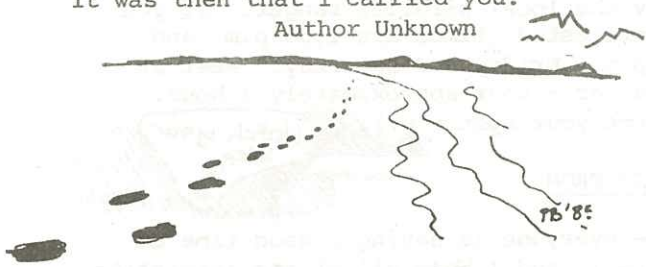
"Lord, you said that once I decided to follow you, you would walk with me all the way, but I have noticed that during the most troublesome times in my life there is only one set of footprints.

THE COCONUT ISLANDERS

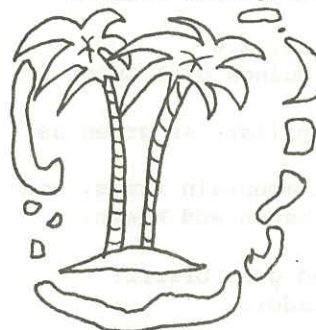
Two scouts and a guider at the Jamborella come from the Cocos (Keeling) Islands in the Indian Ocean, about half way between Perth and India. The Islands are an external territory of Australia, and the Brownies, Guides, Cubs and Scouts there are attached to the Western Australian Branches of those Associations.

There are 27 islands in the Cocos Group and they have a combined area of 14 km². Only two of the islands are inhabited: 220 Australians live on West Island

and 350 Cocos-Malays live on Home Island. Cocos-Malays are closely related to Malaysians, and their language is a dialect of bahasa Malayu.

Over half of our population is under 15 years years of age so the Guiding and Scouting movements are very strong. If you'd like to find out more about the Cocos (Keeling) Islands, have a talk to Chris Melkus, Abie Harrison or Jancy Parker. 1.10.

CANTEEN

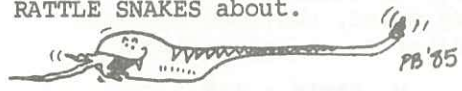
Thanks to all for your courtesty and patience especially on Visitor's Day - I think the 6000 visitors and all the campers must have visited our "camp site" that day.

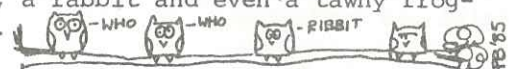
