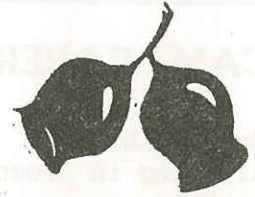

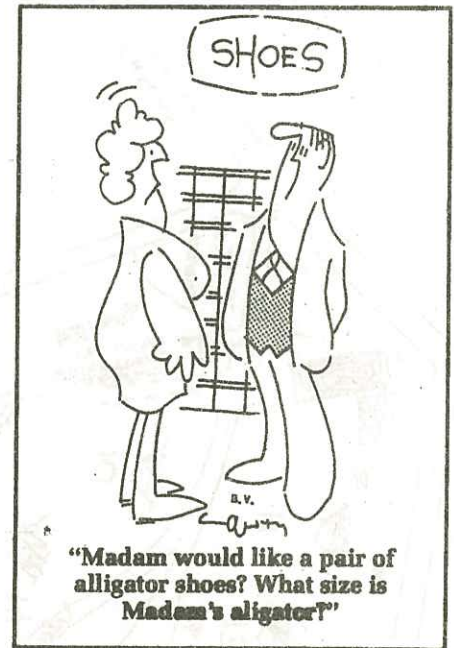
CROCODILE AT CAMP

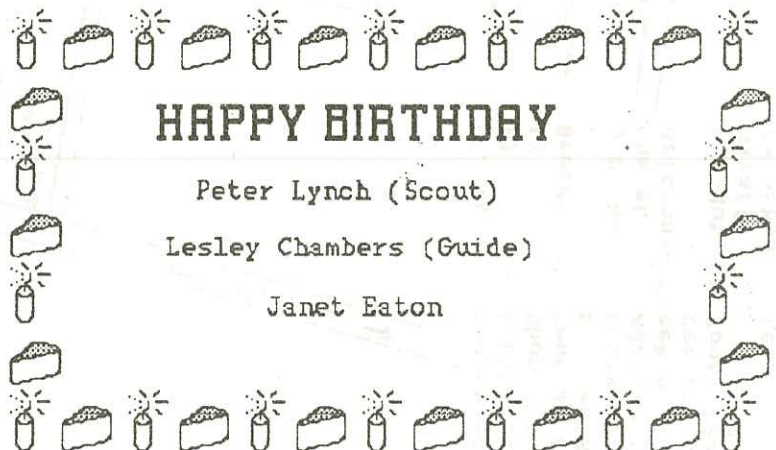

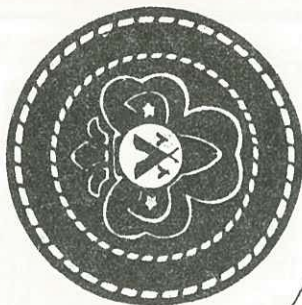
The bus goes 5 times faster than the scouts walk. If X = time on the bus, then it will take 5X time to walk back.

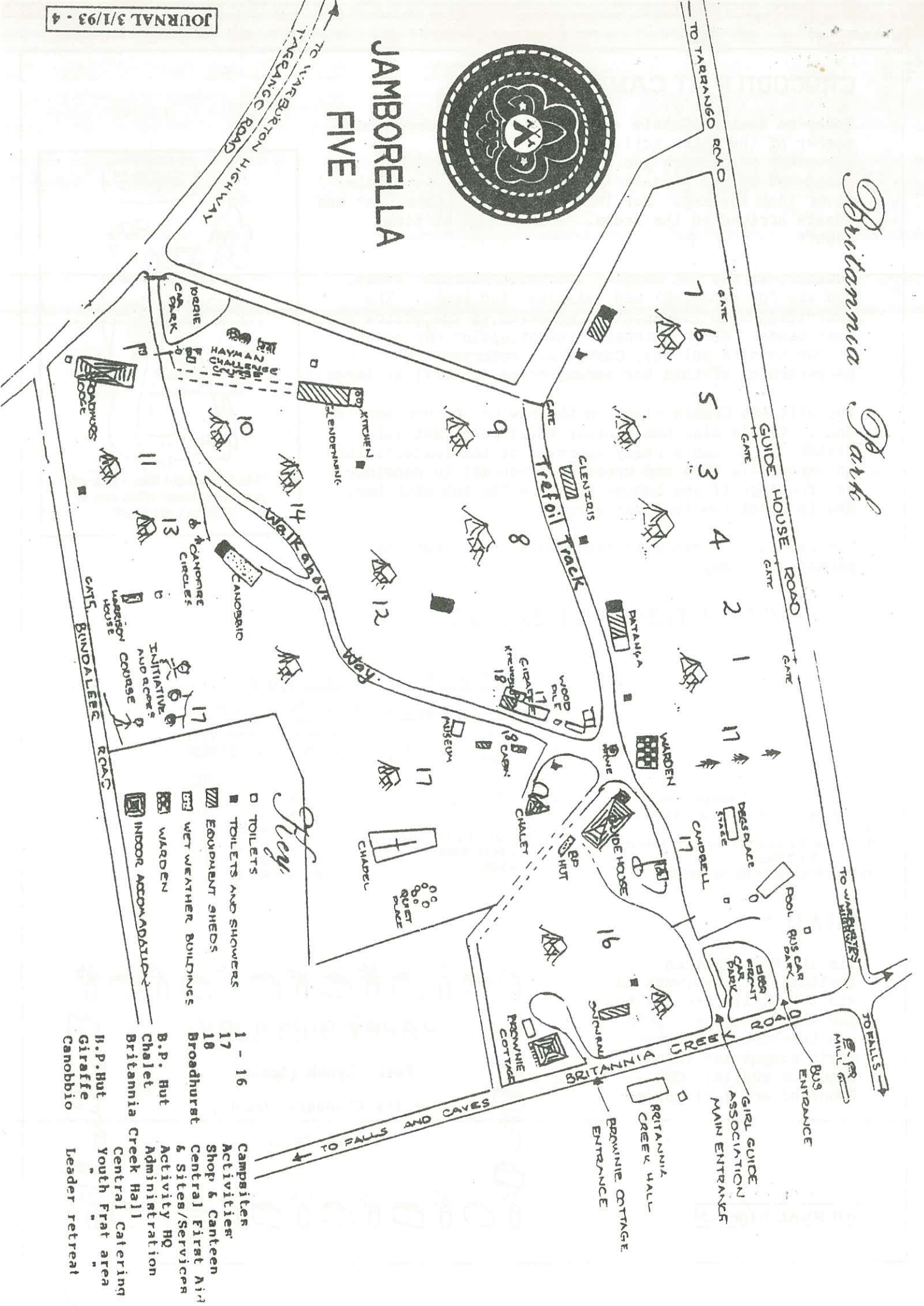
