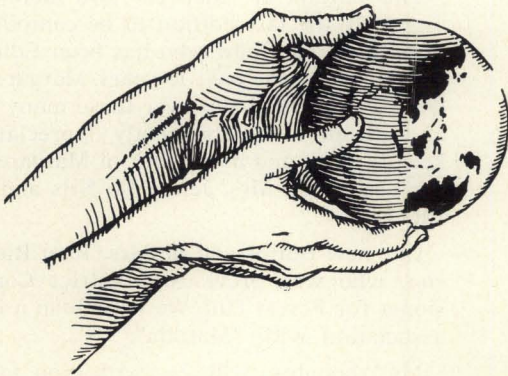

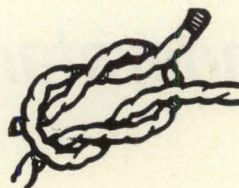

The Guide Association of Victoria offered its services to the Australian Red Cross immediately the need for help was known.

For five days teams of guide people filled a useful role at Red Cross H.Q. answering telephone calls, and helping in the enormous task of recording and tracing missing persons and evacuees.

Day programmes have been conducted for the children housed in the Commonwealth Migrant Hostels and assistance given there with necessary interviews and surveys.

A Guide Darwin Relief Appeal has been opened and donations will be used to help individual families, to assist in the re-establishment of Guiding in Darwin, to ease the problems facing evacuees etc.

In the meantime many companies, packs and individuals have given help in many ways — two we have heard of are — Moor-

bark brownies and guides raised \$800 for the Sun-Herald appeal; 1st Baxter company, formed only last April, and working hard for their camp equipment, held a stall and raised \$100.

FAREWELL "CENTS FOR SERVICE"... WELCOME "APRIL ACTION"

Remember the questionnaire distributed during 1974 in which you were asked to give thoughts and suggestions for "Cents for Service" in your Districts?

The response was very good and we thank most sincerely those Leaders and Girls who completed the form and offered so many constructive comments and ideas.

After studying the returns, the following conclusions were reached —

1. Girls raise more money per head in group activities than in individual efforts.
2. Brownies and younger Guides are the only ones who enjoy doing individual jobs.
3. Most Leaders, Mothers and older Girls favour group activities.
4. Leaders, generally, accept the need to financially support Guiding in Victoria.
5. Units would like more information on where the money sent to Headquarters is used.
6. It was mainly new Leaders with new Units who like the printed material — many Units doing group activities do not use it.
7. Many Units and girls would like longer than a week for fund-raising.
8. Many felt the word "service" should not be included in the name, as it is felt that our girls should not get paid for doing service for one week in the year, and be expected to carry out service without payment for the rest of the year.
9. Some suggest dividing the money differently to help the District or Region with funds, while others would prefer to help charities outside Guiding, but they are still happy to send a proportion to Headquarters.
10. Two suggestions for a State-wide drive are —
 - (a) Selling Girl Guide Biscuits at one time in the year.
 - (b) Arranging a Car Wash through one of the oil companies on one weekend in the year.

There were other comments and suggestions, but the ones mentioned were the most significant to warrant a change in format of this annual fund-raising event.

As a result of many discussions on these suggestions, the following changes will take place in 1975 —

1. The new name of the drive will be **"APRIL ACTION"**.
2. The drive can take place at any time during April.
3. Group activities for fund-raising will be stressed more than ever. However, individual efforts will still be permitted if desired, and cards for this purpose will be available from Guide Headquarters on request. It is most essential that girls doing individual activities use these cards when calling on householders.
4. Girls in Units should discuss before the drive how their half of the amount raised could be used to help Guiding. If there is no need to keep the money in the Unit, a donation could be made to a Guiding project which could benefit girls in other areas, within Australia or overseas, for instance — the Irene Fairbairn Award Fund for Australians to participate in overseas events; Friends of World Centres Fund towards operating costs of the Guide Centres in India, Mexico, Switzerland and England; Mutual Aid Scheme which, among other things, assists Guides in lesser-developed countries to go camping; or the National Development Scheme in Australia to help introduce Guiding in high-density or remote areas.
5. The other half of the money raised will go to Headquarters to help finance Guiding throughout Victoria. The majority of this goes towards general administrative costs, while part of it helps the Camping Department to develop and maintain the camping properties at Britannia Park and Shoreham, and some helps the Training Department to purchase new training aids and equipment, and also travelling expenses for qualified trainers to visit country areas. All these things will benefit the girls in the Movement.

6. The only printed material to be distributed to Units will be a Unit Form, which will include a letter from our State Commissioner to the Girls and the Leaders, and a tear-off page which we ask for your co-operation in fully completing. These will be available for collection from Headquarters after 10th February. Those not collected by the end of February will be distributed at the Commissioners' Conference.

We are sure you will be happy with these changes, and know that they will give you more scope and incentive to plan exciting activities, making them great financial successes and giving you lots of fun.

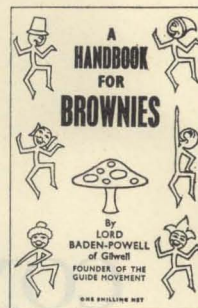
Second Simpson Brownie Pack had a very busy weekend when we were hosts to the 10th Geelong St. Matthew's Pack.

Dear Matilda,

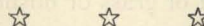
I would like to tell you how we celebrated the Diamond Jubilee of Brownies. We planned the celebrations in Pow-wow.

CONSERVATION



What sunny sizzlers our summers can be!!!

I guess many of you have been wincing when people touched your sunburn? Or perhaps you are one of the wise ones who wear hats and lots of suncream to prevent burning? I'm afraid I'm a real burner and usually forget to use cream and finish up bright red and very uncomfortable.

At this time of year a lot of city people relax by the sea or cool off in the evenings on the front porch. Some, on the outskirts of the city may see the faint blue smokey haze from distant fires, and read about outbreaks in the daily papers.

But to those of us in the country it is a time for keeping close to home, and checking out all our fire precautions, preparing for the dreaded threat of grass or bushfire.

Every year thousands of acres of bush and grassland are lost, stock and native animals are killed and people lose their homes as fire sweeps across the State.

Guides and Brownies who live in country towns will know the awful sound of the town fire siren or bell in summer. They will know too of the fear and worry of families as volunteer firemen, perhaps their own Dads and brothers, race off on the engines to fight these fires.

Many of these outbreaks are caused through the carelessness of people and should never occur. The throwing down of a match or cigarette, a campfire left smouldering, can cause death and destruction over wide areas.

Long grass and thick bushy areas left uncared for near holiday homes quickly catch from a spark carried by warm strong summer winds.

Leaves and grass in spoutings, and carried in under the eaves by birds also catch fire quickly, and haystacks are specially prone to burning in the summer if small children play nearby with matches or fireworks.

Guides are quite big enough to help with fire precautions at home. They can clean out the spouts and eaves and tidy any undergrowth or long grass near the houses.

Brownies may be a bit small to climb ladders but they can play their part by seeing that matches are not left where little children can reach them.

The only time you should handle matches yourselves is when you are lighting your birthday cake or lighting the fire at camp . . . and I should imagine there would be plenty of grown-ups around to help on both occasions!

We can all help prevent fires by learning all the fire rules of our State. These are available on the "Green Pamphlet" from H.Q., or your local fire brigade will help you.

Camping people should be specially sure of the regulations and watch that their fires are safe at all times. (Incidentally, campers, did you know kero lanterns are illegal on Total Fire Ban days?)

There are also things to remember if you are unfortunate enough to be caught in a fire. But I think YOU should tell ME! Send me your ideas and I'll see how many you get right!

Thank you all for such a wonderful response to my appeal for more requests for penfriends in the September issue of "Matilda".

Because of the response there will be many more of you able to think of a penfriend in another part of the world on Thinking Day.

I would still like more of you to ask for penfriends and there is no limit (other than the cost of airmail letter forms) to the number of penfriends each of you can have.

There have to be a few qualifications . . . language and population still govern the choice of countries. Alternative choices of



countries need to be given when writing but the quickest response comes when you state that you are prepared to accept a penfriend from ANY country. Anyone wanting a penfriend in a Commonwealth country should allow nine months or longer for this to be arranged.

Post Box exists only for members of our Girl Guides and Girl Scouts Association so boy penfriends and friends in Communist countries are not available. Neither can requests be taken from non-members of the Association.

Brownie Guides can communicate only within a Unit link. As soon as the Brownie joins a guide unit she can write for an individual link.

When you write for a penfriend please give your name and address: the date of your birth (which is more helpful than your age in years); the name of your Unit; and **please** include a stamped self-addressed envelope for you to receive back the details of your friend.

EARLY YEARS IN AUSTRALIA

"The Girl Guide Movement has the distinguishing feature that it started itself. Girls took up Scouting with their brothers, and we subsequently adapted it to their needs and organised it as a separate movement."

Baden-Powell (see "Adventuring" — June 1974, page 10).

These three stages were completed in New Zealand and in two States of Australia before they came to completion in England, (though there were hundreds, even thousands, of girls set out on the adventure of Scouting) — possibly because the numbers were so much smaller in this part of the world.

The book "Scouting for Boys" appeared early in 1908; the weekly, "The Scout", in April.

The Boy Scout Association was organised in June-July that same year, and at once Baden-Powell asked his friend Lieutenant Colonel Cosgrove, of Christchurch, to be Chief Scout of New Zealand. Lt. Col. Cosgrove found that his youngest daughter, Muriel was interesting her friends to form a Scout patrol at her school in September, 1908. He himself enrolled twenty-four as Girl Peace Scouts, appointed Miss Keith, M.A. to be their Scout Mistress and collected ladies to form a committee for the organisation under his own general supervision. He wrote their special book with the help of his wife and others, dedicated it to the daughter of the Governor-General of New Zealand, the Hon. Ethne Mahine Plunket, and had full permission from Baden-Powell to use any matter he wished from Scouting for Boys.

It is called "Peace Scouting for Girls". Published, July, 1910. A copy is at Australian Headquarters.

During 1909 in Hobart three troops of Girl Peace Scouts were formed under supervision of Mrs. Dobson, president of the Ministering Children's League and ladies of the National Council of Women, corresponding with Lt. Col. Cosgrove.

They were recognised as a parallel movement by the Scout Association.

In Sydney, the Australian League of Girl Aids was formed, in co-operation with Boy Scout Leader, Frank Packer, and with a committee of well-known women.

Lt. Col. Cosgrove seems to have known about the Australian League of Girl Aids, but there was no link of organisation. One unit was formed in Victoria, at Powell-town, and there is rumour of one in Queensland, but numbers were comparatively small and mostly contained in the greater Sydney area.

In England in September occurred the famous Boy Scout rally at Crystal Palace, London, where among eleven thousand Scouts a few girls appeared, and asked B.P. to recognise them within his scheme. When he discovered that at least six thousand girls were already registered as Scouts, the next two stages followed. B.P. himself suggested the name Girl Guides, wrote two pamphlets, made temporary arrangements for girls at the Scout Association, asked his sister to take charge, with a committee; and in May, 1910, the Girl Guide Association was founded.

Miss Baden-Powell planned to write a handbook for Girl Guides. "How Girls can Help to build up the Empire". (The British Empire then included one-fifth of the land of the world.)

When the news came to Australia and New Zealand, Lieutenant-Colonel Cosgrove suggested that an Imperial Association be formed; a Federal system as it were, with members — Girl Peace Scouts, Australian League of Girl Aids, and Girl Guides, each keeping its own identity, and any others from parts of the Empire; South Africa for instance had already units in Johannesburg, at least. It would have been similar it seems to the future World Association, where national Associations keep their own identity. He suggested some overall name like Baden-Powell Girls of the Empire.

In June, 1911, in Hobart the Governor, Sir Harry Barron, and Lady Barron called a meeting to discuss the future of the Girls Organisation in Tasmania, and there it was decided to transfer from the connection with Girl Peace Scouts of N.Z. to become a branch of the Girl Guides' Association in London. Mrs. Dobson was in London at the time in consultation with Miss Baden-Powell — the President.

A committee was appointed at the meeting, where it was reported that fifteen young women were already in training for units for girls within the B.P. scheme.

After May, 1910, individual companies in Victoria (1911) and South Australia (1912) registered direct with Miss Baden-Powell in London until their state associations were set up —

In Sydney the Australian League of Girl Guides phased out after the outbreak of 1st World War, 1914, and apart from scattered private groups, a completely new start was made in 1920 with the Girl Guide Association of N.S.W.

Photostat pages of "History of Girl Guides in N.Z." and the obituary of Lt. Col. Cosgrove, give references to Tasmania, and to fact that the books were sent by request to two publishers in U.S.A., to secretaries of three States of U.S.A., to New York secretariat and to Japan, where a Church of England clergyman in Tokyo enquired. They preceded Miss Baden-Powell's book by at

least two years, and they were geared to the Empire countries in that Scoutmistresses in other parts of the Empire were advised that they should write their own sections on woodcraft, camping, campfire stories of pioneers and flag. A copy was sent to Baden-Powell and at her request to Miss Baden-Powell, though her book is original and on different lines — more distinct from Scouting for Boys in general tone.

Western Australia's Girl Guides' Association was launched enthusiastically at a Public meeting, June 1918. Towards end of 1st World War, and afterwards, Girl Guide Associations in some States had a recession and the movement was stimulated by Guides from England and by suggestions and appointments by Imperial committee which Lady Baden-Powell founded in 1919. In Victoria from 1917, and N.S.W. from 1920, practically a new start was made, but in the early years, B.P. activity for girls rose from among ourselves as Scouting for Boys became known, and it was encouraged and helped by Boy Scout troops and Leaders and we know there were unrecorded patrols here and there.

1909-1914/15 approx. Australian League of Girl Aids. Girl Guides 1920 — formal organisation.

HANDY HINTS TO HELP YOU WITH YOUR NEW UNIT

Brownie Guide Section

You would do well to follow the advice of the Founder, and do as he suggests in the Wolf Cub Handbook. He said "Be content to begin with only a few boys. One is too often tempted to make a start with a large Pack. To do so is to make a mistake. You want first of all to establish the right tone on a small scale, to have a handful of yeast to leaven the lump, when you get it. Even then do not go for too big a Pack. I have found, by experience, that eighteen is as many as I can deal with, giving individual training."

1. Start with six girls aged approximately 8-9 years and train them. When you have had time to observe how they relate to one another divide into 3 "sixes". When these girls have made their Promise at a Promise Ceremony, take the others in small groups of 3 or 4 until you have 18 girls. The reason for limiting the number is that we try to give individual training in the Guide Movement. Each Brownie Guide wants to feel that she has the whole attention and interest of her Guiders.

2. Don't be in too much of a hurry to select the "Sixers". This choice belongs to the Guiders who will need time to observe, listen, in order to get to know the girls so that a wise choice is made. It is a good idea to discuss the qualities of a Sixer with the girls at Pow Wow, so that they understand the kind of a girl a "Sixer" should be and what she could and would be expected to do etc. The Brownie Guides, of course, would need to know that the selection is the responsibility of the Guider.

The Guide Section

Starting a new Unit. Start with 8 girls, discuss the patrol system with them, refer them to their Guide Handbooks, Chapter 3. When they feel ready to make the decision they divide themselves into two patrols.

It is important to build up a good group relationship and to develop leadership potential. Give the girls the opportunity at each meeting to do as much as possible as a patrol. Allow each girl to be a Patrol Leader for one month. She should choose and run a short patrol activity at each meeting. Some assistance is needed from the Guiders, encourage her to discuss her plans and organisation with you so that there is a good chance of it being successful. This is the beginning of

P.L. Training. Direct her attention to her Guide Handbook, provide games books and "Patrol Ideas Book" published by the Girl Guides Association of Australia.

When each girl has had a turn leading the Patrol and after new girls have joined P.L. Elections could be held. It is recommended that only 4 new members are taken in, increasing each Patrol by two.

Preparation for P.L. Elections

The most important thing is that the choice of the P.L. is that of the Guides themselves. To help the Guides make a wise choice some preparation is necessary. Discuss with them qualities to look for in a leader. Make clear the responsibilities of being a P.L. Encourage each girl to think of herself. Most Units hold a secret ballot, and each Guide votes for a Leader for her own Patrol. They usually like to vote for a girl within the Patrol, a first and second preference sometimes makes it easier to choose an acceptable girl. When the outcome of the election is clear, it is a good plan for the Guider to speak to the

Guide privately and to ask her if she wishes to accept the appointment and at the same time making sure the Guide understands what is required of her regarding extra time and activities etc. It could be suggested too, that a firm decision be given the following week, after she has had time to discuss it at home, and read the Guide Handbook Chapter 3, and what her own role as a P.L. would be.

The P.L. is usually on probation for 8 to 10 weeks to prove her capability and acceptance, after which a P.L. investiture can be held and P.L. Stripes and Beret Badge presented. The Patrol Second is chosen by the P.L. P.L.s and Seconds may wear lanyards.

The Ranger Section

For about a month the Guiders might take the lead in preparing programmes, based on contributions from the girls. After that time the girls should be ready to elect office-bearers and hold a unit in council thus becoming more responsible for managing their own affairs.

THE DISTRICT COMMISSIONER — HER ROLE

SHE IS P.R. OFFICER and ADMINISTRATOR

and is responsible for:—

- Establishing good relationships between the Leaders and the Local Association and between ALL Guiding personnel and the Community.
- Forming a Local Association and attending the meetings regularly to present her report.
- Holding regular District Guiders meetings where the Unit Leaders gain much help by discussion, airing problems and gaining new ideas etc.
- Registering newly formed units and helping the Unit Leaders when required.
- Finding Suitable Leaders and Testers.

Activities for Small Groups

The girls' Handbook, the Guiders' Handbook and various game books available from the Guide Shop can give you many ideas for activities. With a little thought and imagination these ideas may be adapted for any number of girls.

Concentration: Pairing: On slips of card-board write facts or names that tell the story of Guiding. (Number or letter the pair alike, to help the Guides learn as they play.)
The Founder **A**
Robert Baden-Powell **A**
Guiding first started **B**
in Great Britain **B**

Guides' First President **C**
was Agnes Baden-Powell **C**
Our Chief Guide **D**
is named Olave Baden-Powell **D**

Turn all slips face downward on the table. Each girl in turn turns up 2 and if they pair together she keeps them, if not she lets all others see what they say before turning them face down again and giving the next girl her turn. The one with the most pairs at the end wins.

You can think of any other topics suitable for this activity e.g. Picture of a bird and on a second card — Bird's name, or Knots and their correct uses can be paired.

Kim's Game and Observation:

First step: Take a Christmas card (or a flower, or picture, or piece of material) each in turn tells a fact about it, and passes it on. Any one who cannot think of a further observation drops out, and the one most observant keeps going the longest.

Even better practice is to repeat, in the correct order, all the other observations made before adding to the list.

Guide Law Jig-Saw

Write out the Laws in texta-colour on thin cardboard, drawing paper or strong brown paper. Cut with scissors into, say 20 pieces. Who can assemble the quickest? If you make a jig-saw for each Patrol, use different colour background or texta-colour in case pieces get mixed.

Let's Go Fishing

Make a "fishing line" with a hook or a magnet on the end for each Six. Cut out a quantity of fish shapes from paper or cardboard and attach a wire ring or piece of metal on the nose of each fish so that it can be picked up. On each fish write a question. The fish are placed in a "pool" in the middle of the floor. Reference books to find the answers are available. On signal, one member of each Six "catches" a fish and the other members of the Six try to find the answer. If they find the answer they keep the fish, if not they throw it back. The Six with the most fish "correctly answered" wins.

This activity can be used for Road Safety, Home Safety, Knowledge of Movement, First Aid, Uniform, Clothes on Fire. What others can you think of?

The Brownie Guides enjoy making fishing lines and the fish!!!

Goal

Partners stand facing each other with their feet apart. A ball is placed on floor mid-way between. At a given signal, each girl tries to kick the ball between partner's feet.

A PLAN IS BORN

Sitting round a log fire can be satisfying, rewarding, even creative.

Soon after Miss Margaret Coleman became Australian Training Adviser, the Australian Training Committee of the time, meeting with her round a glowing fire, thought about (i) **A.L.T.P.**, which stands for **The Australian Leadership Training Plan** and (2) **Leaders Workbook**.

Trainers have had the A.L.T.P. for some time, and now comes your turn.

The Leaders Workbook is now ready and this is what Miss Coleman writes about it:— "It has been designed to assist **ALL** leaders. It is an aid to YOUR development and progress. It will help YOU become a more effective leader. It does not replace the Leader's Handbook or other printed material it is a supplement to them and is intended to help you set your own learning goals — it will help you find out what you know and where you need to find out more. You may work through sections of it by yourself, or in groups, in your own time and at your own pace.

It is a loose-leaf book so you may add your own notes and comments, and pages may be replaced if the information becomes out of date — thus saving the expense of buying a whole new book.

The Australian Training Committee hopes that you will find this a useful supplement to your leadership knowledge, and would welcome your comments. The Committee is most appreciative of the time, effort, and expertise given freely by those who made such a book possible."

LEADER'S WORKBOOK (available now in the Guide Shop).

This will help you plan your programmes — see Pages 57-72. Here are some extracts to start you off.

Page 63 likens a good programme to baking of cake.

Thus: **PREPARATION:** Take the ideas, interests, suggestions of Guides and Leaders in Pow-Wow, Patrol Council, Leaders' Council.

INGREDIENTS: An equal measure of each of the points of the 8 Point Programme.

METHOD: Blend together with games, outings, visitors, camps, quizzes, discoveries, challenges, hikes, ventures, songs. Ensure that plenty of fun is added and that everyone has a stir of the cake!

And then you are asked (in the space left for your answer) "Do the girls keep asking for another slice, or do they leave it on the plate?"

The challenge to us, of course, is "More please!"

On Page 69, we read: "Give every opportunity for the guides to organize, carry through, and be responsible for as much as possible. Do not underestimate the ability of your guides — give them a chance to prove what they can do, and to learn and grow through doing.

Then, on the next page, your own assessment sheet gives space for a Yes/No answer to questions such as

Did you do all the preparation, and provide equipment, etc?

OR Did the girls share this responsibility?

The book is typed, on quarto size paper, and there are plenty of sketches.

It is truly a "Workbook" with spaces for you to jot down notes, assess unit activities, find and note the answers to questions asked, and room to list comments from the girls in your Unit. There are many ideas on Leadership, Challenge and Self-Assessment.

SURREY JUBILEE

The village was selected by the district authorities as there was a great need for such a shelter there. During 1973, this village was completely washed away. After a year the villagers started building their new houses. They are happy to see that the Girl Guides are taking interest in them, and are helping towards their rehabilitation work.

This centre will be used as a flood relief shelter during floods and a community Centre and Dispensary during normal times. Begum M. H. Sherazee, Deputy National Commissioner and Provincial Commissioner, Punjab fixed the stone at the Centre. The writing on the stone is in Urdu and English. It reads—

 3. When you are reporting an event, please remember that "Matilda" is interested in **HOW** you planned, the **RESULTS** of your work, and any **HINTS** to others planning similar activities. Don't overload your stories with lists of names and local detail, for "Matilda" serves a wide public.
 4. If you are sending in a report which has already appeared in your local paper (although you must remember that reports for local papers differ in approach to reports for "Matilda"), will you make sure that you have permission for the article to be reprinted in "Matilda". The laws of copyright are very strict, and it is easier for local people to contact the papers than for "Matilda" to do it. Please send "Matilda" the name and address of your paper so that a copy of the relevant issue can be forwarded to the Editor in due course for his records.

SYBIL HOWY IRVING, M.B.E.

When Sybil Irving became State Secretary of the Girl Guides in Victoria I was a young and enthusiastic captain of a country company in S.A.

I well remember the thrill it gave me, on a short holiday in Melbourne, to meet her at H.Q.

She had about her a sort of aura made up of good looks, charm and energy. One sensed her tremendous integrity, and felt that here was one to whom the Guide promise meant a great deal. She obviously had great powers of leadership.

Fortunately for Australia this was recognised, and in August 1941 she was appointed Controller of the Australian Womens Army Service which she had to raise and organise.

Those of us who knew her were certain it would be the success it proved and many Guides enlisted in all States.

Miss Irving perhaps never received the public recognition so well deserved but those who knew and worked with her in Guiding, Red Cross, the Army, the Crippled Children's Association, and the Council of the Ageing, and her personal friends will never forget her.

"To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die." For that reason we want to perpetuate her memory through a National Memorial which will benefit members of all the organisations she served so well and faithfully.

Uniform is not worn by those accepting appointment as Unit Helpers.
