## From our State Commissioner

Dear Members and Friends,

It is frequently brought home to us that in Guiding we do not **give** so much as **share**. How often do we as Leaders learn just as much from the girls as they learn from us. This was brought home to me in a number of small ways by my own children just recently.

One Friday evening, I took Ann shopping for some clothes — frequently a traumatic experience, but this time even more so in that we were trying to buy shoes! We had been to a number of shops and been through the usual procedure each time —

Ann: "Those are nice — just what I want."

Me: "You can't wear those — they're much too high — What about these, they look nice."

Ann: "Ooh Mum, they're awful!"

As we went up the escalator to try for about the fifth time — I felt cranky and irritable and my face obviously was registering my displeasure. Suddenly Ann turned around and with a delightful smile said "Mum I don't think you are keeping the Guide Law."

We both laughed, stepped into the shoe department, and this time with a little compromise managed to buy some shoes which made Ann a very happy girl — and I do not mind. Ann had given me that small reminder sometimes necessary and I also realized that whilst Ann has now resigned as a Lone Guide — the training she has had up until now has left its mark.

The day following this episode was the Head of the River, and the Grimwade family,

amidst thousands of others, spent the day barracking for their respective crews.

These boys had been training for months to row together as a crew and rowing is the one sport where they must really work together — one small slip can throw everything out.

As I watched and cheered myself hoarse, I was very impressed with the attitude of the boys. They had all tried their very best, and if they hadn't made the first crew, they were happy for friends who had. If they won a heat they were excited, elated and waiting for the final; when they didn't win they knew they had really tried and showed genuine pleasure in congratulating the winning crew.

It had been fun, but also hard work. Each crew had done its best and the best crew had won. Then it was over — they were ready to move onto the next thing in their very busy lives.

This day showed me how many aspects of the Guide Promise and Law these youngsters were carrying out, and I could only hope that they would be just the same in twenty years time. That they would have the same sense of values and priorities — the same wonderful loyalties to their friends and their ideals, and this same sense of fun and zest for living — as I said in the beginning, we can learn much from the young and particularly those who are members of the Guide Movement.

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## Australian Association Assembly

On Sunday afternoon, 18th May, 8 delegates from each state, and Australian Headquarters personnel gathered at La Trobe University to participate in the first Australian Association Assembly.

We were welcomed by Mrs. Verna Surry and her Hostess Committee and shown to our rooms in Menzies College. In each room, we found gifts made for us by Victorian members, place mat, fruit bowl (made by Brownies), sewing kit, book mark, paper clip/holder, serviette and wooden ring. Also there was a handkerchief rose in a small pottery vase, and a zippered folder containing maps, and information on Victoria, pens, notebook, and a recent copy of "Matilda".

At dinner that evening we met interstate members and Australian Headquarters personnel. State delegates included State Commissioner, State Secretary, Training, Public Relations and International Advisers, one of the Section Advisers and 2 "under 30". (We were the "under 30" delegates).

Monday found us involved in "sessions" with the various Advisers. While these sessions were being held, Australian Executive was also meeting. Adviser's meetings went on for 2 days and then, in groups, we discussed various parts of the World Conference agenda.

We managed to have time away from the business part of the Assembly and our first break came on Monday night when we attended the official opening of the Assembly at Kew Civic Centre. A Guide guard of honour greeted special guests, including Lady Winneke, our State President and Senator Margaret Guilfoyle, who addressed us and then opened the Assembly. Most States had their State Standards, and these were carried into the hall by Rangers, with each

State Commissioner following her Standard. Brownies presented flowers to Lady Winneke and Senator Guilfoyle. We enjoyed a short display by Brownies and Guides and musical items from our Guide Choir. During supper many reunions were made.

On Tuesday evening we attended a reception at Government House. Later, at Guide Headquarters, we enjoyed a sumptuous buffet dinner. Special thanks to the Special Activities Committee for looking after us so well that night.

On Tuesday afternoon, some delegates, including Miss Lambie, our Chief Commissioner, went to Channel 2 studios at Ripponlea to be interviewed for "This Day Tonight".

On Wednesday evening and during Thursday, summaries from discussion groups and adviser's meetings were presented to the Assembly. Mrs. Joyce Price, our Life Vice-President, conducted discussions on the World Conference agenda items.

On Thursday evening, because we had completed the day's agenda early, we relaxed informally, singing favourite camp-songs. Many old songs remembered and new ones were learnt too.

Each day about 12 Victorian Guiders came as observers, and they joined discussion groups and participated where possible. In lounges and bedrooms, chatting over countless cups of coffee continued late into most evenings.

Morning and evening devotions were shared by interstate members. The closing ceremony, with State Standards as back drop concluded a busy, but enjoyable and fulfilling week at the first Australian Association Assembly.

## GIRL GUIDES OF AUSTRALIA DISCOVERIES 7

### RALLY HELD AT SYDNEY SHOW-GROUND, 2nd DECEMBER, 1922

Saturday, 2nd December, 1922, dawned a bright, sunny day, full of excitement for the Guides in New South Wales. Early in the morning, about 9 a.m., trams disgorged masses of blue clad figures, complete with black shoes and stockings and huge straw hats, to stream across Moore Park towards the showground. Smaller figures clad in brown, each sheltering under a huge brown mushroom (Brownie hats looked so like mushrooms), accompany them. If one looked under straw hats one discovered the bright, eager faces of Girl Guides—that new “thing” for girls—while under the brown mushrooms were faces of the Brownies with huge Brownie smiles firmly pinned on them. Such excitement!!!! This was the first public Rally and Badge Display held in New South Wales. Months of work and preparation were to come to reality at last.

The Guides quickly formed company in four ranks, and with Miss Nella Levy out in front, marched into the Showground. 1st Mosman Company had the honour of leading the parade—they were the only Company with a brass trefoil on the flagpole. (Their Guider is now Mrs. Relton.)

Once inside the Showground the Companies and Packs quickly found their allotted space and began setting up their displays ready for the general public. It would be hard to imagine any badge which was not displayed. The Dairymaid Badge, complete with real live cow, which at some time of the proceedings was duly milked. The Animal Lover Badge caused some merriment when a pig broke bounds and found its way on to the arena. Small Scouts appeared out of the blue, or so it seemed, to help (?) catch the animal. Consternation during the display of the Horsewoman Badge when one of the riders was thrown from her horse! Two small Brownies, with tears pouring down their little faces, came up to Brown Owl for consolation. “But, Brown Owl, if their Captain has to stay in hospital, how will the Guides get home?” Concern for the unfortunate Guider was quickly dispelled.

Grace Johnstone, a Lone Guide, sat cross-legged in the traditional manner and mended shoes. Passers-by could have their shoes heeled while they waited. Manly Company chose the Entertainer Badge, and put on a very good show every hour during the day. The Laundress Badge, First Aid, Home Nursing, Child Nurse, Folk Dancing, Camping, Cook’s Badge, and Gymnast—all had a place, with practical demonstrations. The public sat in the stand to watch the “ring events”, or wandered around the exhibits, and were most suitably impressed.

The Brownies were a great success, and, as usual, won the hearts of all present. Among other things they displayed, they played singing games, formed Fairy Rings, and gave a grand howl for the V.I.P.s.

The end of the day came all too soon, when the displays were dismantled, and the grounds left neat and tidy, for “where we have been, no-one can find, never a trace we leave behind”. The Guides again formed company and marched across the park to catch trams which would take them home, tired but happy, and still bubbling with excitement.

The first big public display, thanks to the organising ability of “The Lev”, was a success. Sydney knew that the Girl Guides had “arrived” and would become part of the way of life.


#### NOTE

The Girl Guides Association of N.S.W. dates from late 1920, when Lady Davidson, wife of the State Governor, invited Miss Nella Levy to organize Guiding throughout the State.


Our Company held a very successful Mother and Daughter night. We invited our mothers to come to see what happens at Guide meetings.

## CONSERVATION

### MINIBIKES

When I was young (a long time ago) I owned a small motor bike . . . which was quite unladylike in those days!

Actually it was more a motorised bicycle but it was lots of fun to ride, and I needed a motor cycle licence to use it. With my long hair streaming in the wind I could get up to 40 kph. on that bike and I felt like a speedway driver!

Today many young people own motor bikes. Guides ride and race minibikes, and more people are buying trail bikes and dune buggies or four wheel drive vehicles to travel overland away from roads.

From this we see that people have much recreation time.

Sadly, misuse of this leisure has a terrible effect on some of our surroundings.

Recently the Ranger of one of our National Parks told us of two trail bike riders who damaged acres of bushland by taking a ride off the beaten track. A couple of small bikes can destroy an acre of plant life in minutes!

Unfortunately, few of these weekend "fun" riders and drivers take the same track back to the road, so damage to our bushland or beaches is doubled.

Perhaps you feel this isn't a Guide problem?

If we drive or ride we can do so more carefully and stay on formed roads where possible. After all, there is so much more to see if we walk quietly in the bush. Wildlife will not stay if we roar through bracken and undergrowth . . . and there is a greater chance of personal injury by being tossed over a log or tree stump.

If **YOU** have a mini bike or enjoy trail riding, perhaps you will remember that your vehicle is meant for pleasure but not at the expense of our beautiful bushland which others enjoy so much.

**PS.** Just between you and me . . . I would love a little motor bike right **NOW** . . . it would be so handy around camp . . . especially up that steep hill!






Find the countries on a world map. Consult charts, or "Trefoil Round the World", to see the badge. Colour the guide/brownie uniform of one country in the painting book.

Useful references:

"The Wolf that never sleeps"

"Help yourself to know Baden Powell", by Betty Clay

(A longer book for those who enjoy reading is "27 years with Baden Powell" — written by a former secretary of the Founder.

Guiders will find sections of that suitable to include in yarns to their girls — my imagination was stirred when I read of B.P. on Christmas morning sitting on the floor with unwrapped gifts all round him, busy writing "thank you" notes straight away, since "a gift is not yours until you have thanked the giver".

2. Some P.L. Councils, feeling that Guides should read either some of Baden Powell's own books, or some of the books written about him, challenge the Guides in their unit, as part of earning their second or third 8 Point Badge, to read and discuss one such book. **Why not discuss this with your P.L.'s?** The 2 books named above would be very suitable for this.

It helps some girls to think more carefully about the meaning of what they read if they have a list of questions to which they find the answers as they read. Here is a suggested Reader's Quiz "for another interesting book", entitled "B.P." by Reynolds.

(a) Baden Powell was good at dramatic work and theatricals. Give the numbers of the pages where you read of this.

- (b) He was also an artist. What was the meaning of some butterfly drawings he once did?
- (c) B.P. was a good organizer. As an army officer, he was from time to time given the job of organizing some special force. Name 2 of these.
- (d) He also had original ideas. Tell your patrol 2 ways in which, when Mafeking was besieged, he bluffed the Boer enemy into thinking he had a big army inside the town.

3. In the following statements about B.P. taken from "Help yourself to know Baden Powell":


Each was broken, as indicated, the 2 parts being printed on separate cards.

These 20 cards give a good concentration game. Play it first with Patrol Leaders, and suggest they, in turn, borrow the cards to play the game with their patrols during patrol time:

Scatter the cards on the table, face down. Each in turn picks up 2. If they pair, she keeps them. If not, she lets the other players know what is on each card, and they watch (and try to remember) where she puts them down again. Who can get most pairs?

10. Baden Powell was born on 22nd February, 1857, in London.





A guider should not feel she must buy all these books herself. What about a small, but well selected (and Sue hopes — well used) company library?

2. The main facts — as below — can be taught by simple pairing of cards. Useful activity for a six; P.L.'s at training; then patrol during patrol time; by an individual to challenge her own knowledge. Cards of 2 colours, those bearing the first half of the sentence to be lettered A — B — C etc. to get the right continuity.

- Before 1901 // the States were separate.
- During 1901 Commonwealth of Australia was achieved // States joined together under a Federal Parliament.
- A flag was needed, so // a competition was held.
- Conditions to guide those submitting a design said //
  - something to show loyalty to the crown
  - something to symbolize federation
  - something typical of Australia
- Designs were judged, and by 1903 // Australia had a flag.
- Originally — flags with a blue background were flown by Government authorities // and private citizens used those with a red background.
- The Union Jack was in the place of

honour (refer condition 1) // the top near the hoist.

- Originally, also, the federal star (refer condition ii) // had 6 points, one for each State.
- The stars of the Southern Cross (refer condition iii) // had differing numbers of points.
- Since then, there have been // several changes.
- In 1908, a seventh point // was added to the Federal Star, to represent the Territories.
- About 1915, the 4 main stars of the Southern Cross // were made with 7 points each, the smallest one retaining its 5 points.
- During the Queen's visit during 1954 it was decided // the blue background would be the official Australian Flag for all occasions.

Be sure to show, on the back — something by which the girls will know if their sentences are correctly completed when they add the card of a second colour — both cards for each sentence marked with same number or symbol.






## WHAT'S DOING IN RANGER SECTION

## RECIPE CORNER

### HUNGARIAN GOULASH

1½ lbs. Bladebone Steak, 1 onion sliced 1 oz. butter, 2 medium tomatoes, ½ pint water, salt to taste, 1 teaspoon paprika, 4 medium potatoes.

Cut steak into 1 inch pieces. Cook sliced onion in butter until tender. Add meat and brown, then peeled and quartered tomatoes and water. Season with salt and paprika. Simmer for 1 hour. Peel potatoes and cut into long pieces, and add to goulash and simmer a further ½ hour. Serve with rice or noodles.
